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A FRIENDLY REMINDER ABOUT DOG CONTROL

When walking your dogs on the town oval, please ensure you are in complete control of your animal at <u>all times</u> and dispose of any waste in the rubbish bins provided by Council.

The Shire of Meekatharra provide the Town Oval as the only off-lease exercise area in town—at all other locations your dog must, according to law, be collared and restrained.

To allow your dog to be unrestrained in public is an offence in the Dog Act 1976.

Being responsible for a dog that attacks a person causing injury is also an offence which attracts a significant penalty of up to \$10,000.

Please be a responsible pet owner—keep your dog restrained when exercising them to avoid both injury to bystanders, and significant penalties, and please pick up any droppings left behind. Nobody wants to step in that!!

The Shire of Meekatharra support the neutering and desexing of pets to reduce the number of strays, and provide sponsorship to the Murdoch Veterinary Clinic to attend Meekatharra to provide this service at no cost to health care card holders. Additionally, the Shire fund regular visiting vet service—Newman Veterinary Clinic—to the value of \$5,000 to neuter the pets of health care card holders at no cost to the owner.

Local residents can access this service by attending the Shire Office to present your Health Care Card and prove registration. You will be issued with a voucher for the appropriate service at the visiting clinic.

Winding It Up

At 9:00 am Saturday 18 January the Annual General Meeting of Electors will take place at the Shire office. The order of business will be:

- 1. Reading of the Auditor's Report
- 2. President's Report
- 3. Receiving of 2018/19 Financial Statements
- 4. Other General Business

The Annual Report, which includes the above-mentioned Financial Statements and Auditor's Report, is available for inspection at the Shire Office in Main Street, Meekatharra, during normal office hours. In accordance with Section 5.27 of the Local Government Act 1995, the general meeting of electors is to be held once every financial year to consider the the contents of the annual report for the previous year, and to consider other general business.

An elector is defined in the Local Government Act 1995 as a person who is eligible to vote in an election in the relevant Shire or City. The definition of an elector includes ratepayers.

It's all part of winding up the past year and looking ahead to future plans and ideas. For more information about the Annual General Meeting of Electors, contact the Shire office.

Much of the December Council Meeting was taken up with planning approvals for the members Meektharra Solar Consortium. Spearheaded by Royal Mail Hotel owner Gitte Heijs, the Consortium is a group of locals with large roof space who are working towards a community solar power supply.

In December, the Council gave planning permission for solar panels and associated tech installation to Consortium members The Royal Mail and Made In Meeka, and to the Auski Motel. Further news about the Consortium is pending as discussions with Horizon Power continue.

Takin' Care of Business

Locals who participated in the community consultation workshop and surveys will be pleased to know that the Shire is acting on the suggestions and thoughts that were expressed. A report with the outcomes and suggestions will be tabled fore Council, who will then undertake workshops to determine a five year strategy.

Over the last year, the National Indigenous Australians Agency has been formulating and facilitating an industry workgroup, with the intention of building and growing commercial activities and employment in the region. Initially composed of the NIAA, Yulella, Westgold, Sandfire and Australian Vanadium, the group is working to include local government and businesses.

In an exciting development, the workgroup will host a business forum in Meekatharra in April. It will be open to all local business people, whether it's solo entrepreneurs, artists, family businesses or larger regional businesses who either have a base in Meeka or who make regular visits to service our area.

A list of 53 potential business owner/reps has been compiled for participation, so if you're in business, watch this space. If you're not sure you're on the list, you can contact Gaylene Newton at the NIAA via Gaylene.NEWTON@official.niaa.gov.au.

This will be an opportunity to open up dialogue between industry and community, the first steps in addressing local business concerns and how industry can better engage with the community on a practical front, such as jobs, investment and contracting.

You're welcome to attend the monthly Council meetings (dates and times are listed in The Dust) and have your say. You can also obtain a copy of the Council Minutes to find out about the many other projects, discussions and improvements that the Shire is undertaking on behalf of the Meeka community. CATS - NOT SO MUSICAL

The Shire will once again be hosting the Murdoch University veterinary team for a pet desexing visit in April. Community and Services Development Manager Tralee Cable and local animal welfare advocate Anna Johnson are helping to coordinate a support team similar to last year, helping locals get their pets signed up and setting up the pick-up and drop-off schedule. If you would like to lend a hand either in helping people sign up or helping out on any of the days of the vet visit, get in touch with Anna on 0413 621 786 or drop in to the Shire office during normal business hours.

Unlike the recent movie release of "Cats", Meeka's own miaow-merchants are anything but musical, and are an increasing problem in town and the bush. Are you struggling with strays at your place? The vet visit program can provide desex and return, or euthanase.

We would like locals to consider the fact that shelters are bursting with unwanted cats and that it is now almost impossible to rehome them. Stray/feral cats and kittens face a grim future in Meekatharra, and have little or no hope of finding a home, so it is kinder to offer them the painless option of euthanasia.

If you have multiple animals - particularly strays who are simply living at your property - and the cost of registration is an issue for you (the desexing and health check are free), please get in touch with the Shire to discuss a solution. We are here to help.

Long time local projectionist Darcy reminisced about the time he spent spinning some reels in the little room upstairs, and we look forward to involving him in the reclamation of some of the very antique equipment that remains in storage at the site.

Thankfully, the new projector accepted a modern DVD, and the task proved to be quite simple in the end.



VacSwim is Australia's longest running swimming lesson program, operating for more than 100 years. VacSwim offers swimming lessons for children aged five to 17 years of age, in both the October and January school holidays.

Your children can join in the fun of learning to swim and vital swimming and water safety skills with lessons conducted at pools and open water venues across the State. VacSwim has grown from its beginnings in 1919 when five instructors taught 248 children at three venues, to become the largest vacation swimming program in Australia. In recent years, 55 000 children participate in lessons each year with more than 1500 qualified instructors at more than 180 locations throughout the State




We're well and truly in the midst of summer now. It seems no matter which direction the wind comes from, it's hot. And if there's no breeze it feels even hotter plus the flies are a lot more prominent and effective at attacking our faces.

Let's all escape indoors, crank the aircon up, put our feet up and crack a coldie!

Here are a few energy saving tips (of course - we're your local environmental group after all) to get you through summer:

No point having the aircon cranked up all day whilst you're out and about, especially if you have an old house that leaks air like a sieve. If you have a



split system it should have a timer function: set the timer so the aircon to comes on 15 minutes before you're due home. It will have cooled the room down without having cost you hours of electricity.

The optimum temperature for aircons in our Meeka climate is around 23 degrees Celsius. You might be tempted to set it to as low as it can go, but when it's 42 degrees outside, and your body temperature is 37 degrees, then anything under 25 feels wonderfully cool. To your body it doesn't matter whether it's blowing air at 23 or 18 degrees - but to your electricity consumption it does matter. And why would you want to waste money that you could instead invest in some icy cold beers? (note: we are not financial advisers. "investing" in beer is not a thing. Unless you own a brewery.)

Keep your blinds closed to block out the hot afternoon sun. Plant a tree on your west/south westerly side to shade your house.



Reminiscing about those lovely cold showers we used to get once upon a time in a season other than summer? Yeah well, forget about it. Bonus: the socalled "cold" tap is so lovely tepid that you don't need to spend any energy heating water for your shower.

That allegedly "cold" water is also great for do-• ing your laundry! Don't bother putting the washing machine on "warm" - the "cold" water does the trick just fine; it comes out at 33 degrees anyway!

Best thing to cool down? Take one of those tepid showers, don't towel dry, then stand naked in front of the aircon with your arms stretched out wide. Another reason to keep the blinds closed.

A lot of ceiling fans have a summer and winter setting. The summer setting pushes air down on you, creating a nice breeze that carries your body warmth away, thereby cooling you down. The winter setting sucks the air up and then pushes it down the walls of the room. Great in winter to avoid cold pockets in your house, but utterly ineffective when wanting to cool off in summer. Make sure it's on the right setting! Fans can be highly effective and use less energy than aircons.

Wet a flannel, then put it in the freezer for 10 minutes. Enjoy. Surprise your loved one when they come home hot and sweaty and give them a rub down with that icy cold flannel.

Keep up the fluids (I know we've been talking about cold beer, but when it comes to hydration then water is best).

The Shooting Stars



2019 saw the introduction of the Shooting Stars netball program at the Meekatharra District School. The program is an educational program that uses netball and other vehicles to drive its primary vision of increasing school attendance rates for young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) girls living in remote communities and regional towns to 80-90%.

Shooting Stars works collaboratively with the local community, schools and service providers to affect genuine change in the lives of more than 350 students Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander girls.

Importantly, the program produces results. More than 25% of participants improve attendance term on term, while 50% of participants maintain an average attendance rate of 80% or above. Furthermore, Shooting Stars is a key driver in creating equality for female leaders and generational change, with 85% of its staff and 66% of its Board identifying as Indigenous. The entire community should be very proud of the Meeka Queens and their dedication to improving their attendance at school, and their future prospects.

It was, all in all, a super fun afternoon, and we are already planning for next year—Ho ho ho ho.











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
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Our lovely Sal is away on holidays, just like most of Meekatharra, so we have a mystery guest gardening columnist this month.

Summer in Meekatharra is very hard on our gardens—the wind, the heat, the dry. Don't lose hope, however, there is still work to be done.

It's a great time to get your compost heap in order. Have you that perfect spot yet for fermenting those weeds? A good size for your heap is about 1 meter cubed, so a meter wide, deep and high. Don't forget to allow for air circulation in the heap, so before you fill the pile it helps to place a few lengths of PVC pipe or similar that can be removed later, but will leave a lovely little "tunnel" that allows the air to circulate through to the middle of your heap. We are aiming to use heat to break down the fibres of the compost and create a lovely sweet smelling additive that protects and nurtures the plants through these difficult seasons, and to create the heat we need oxygen and moisture. A perfect mix for compost is a balance of green and brown ingredients, regularly turned to incorporate the oxygen. The mix should not be too wet, or too dry. Too dry will stop the decomposition, and too wet will lead to a nasty smelling sludge. Don't be afraid to stick your hands in and feel the mix, you will be surprised to find you may have a sense of just what is needed and if the mix is right, it will feel good to touch.

GREEN—the "green" component provides valuable nitrogen and will be moist—kitchen scraps, fresh grass clippings, weeds from the garden, manures. You need this component to make compost, but too much will lead to a rotting stinky pile.

BROWN—the "brown" component provides valuable carbon to the mix. This will be things like paper, cardboard, hedge clippings, straw etc. Too much of

this will lead to an abandoned pile in your backyard that nobody wants to take ownership of.

When you make your mixture, try to layer the Brown and the Green, but you don't need to be too scientific. Regular turning of the pile to add oxygen will speed up the composting process, which can take anything from six to 16 weeks, depending on what it is made up of.

You will know your compost is ready when you smell it, and it smells sweet. Truly! I promise you this is true. A well composted pile has an undeniably unique smell, and its one you really want in your garden.

Once you succeed with your first pile, you will find you turn into a different person—soon you will be looking at the cow manure on the side of the road longingly, you will find you are taking plastic bags with you on long road trips to harvest lucky finds, you will put first dibs on the shredded paper at work—its surprisingly addictive.

Compost is great for your garden as it encourages all of the healthy microbes and insects. It protects your plants from heat and cold, and provides valuable nutrients—even in Meekatharra.



A good healthy and sweet compost mix from newspapers, grass clippings and food waste perfect for heat protection for your plants If you are looking for what to plant at this time of year, there are a lot of great online resources. A good one to try is www.gardenate.com which has customisable locations, and a handy little phone app. That makes recommendations on what to plant, when, and how.

Gardening Australia provides a great fact sheet on gardening in arid climates, some of their suggestions include -

- The lawn isn't going to be green all summer;
- That by this time of the year many plants even hardy ones will be looking ratty.
- Trees are important to ameliorate heat and also provide shade for the house.
- Shade, as a gardening tool, is wonderful because it provides lovely shadows and patterns of shadow.
- That even though it's dry you can still have different interesting shades of green, natural shapes and clipped and cut shapes. You can have leaves that absorb or reflect the sunlight. You can also have things that make patterns of shadow through the day.
- You can have yuccas that make really bold foliage statements.
- You can have interesting pots and paving and even little bits of sculpture and stuff that maintain interest and colour in summer when the garden is pretty much at rest.

Much of being successful at gardening in a harsh environment such as the one we experience here is in careful plant selection, preserving shade and trees where possible, changing our expectations of what a garden should look like.

There are many examples of lovely gardens that have been created using hard landscaping structures (ornaments, chairs, pergolas) and desert plants. Typically these have leaves that are tough, leathery, waxy, silver, grey, hairy, succulent, shiny, or needlelike, and use less water than traditional garden plants. You can even explore reusing your grey water (that is from washing machines and showers.). These type of plants and gardens will weather extreme temperatures and events (such as fire or flood) better, and with less interventions.

Once you have settled on your variety of plants, there are other interventions you can take to help your garden survive.

- Zone plants with similar watering requirements together
- Water longer, deeper, but less often
- **Adjust** your reticulation to suit the weather
- Regularly inspect your reticulation
- Use larger pots with saucers below
- Reduce lawn areas (try native plants like lippie)
- Apply soil wetting products
- Mulch your gardens with compost, straw or well rotted manure
- Cultivate Shade and wind protection

But most of all, enjoy your garden and connect with nature. If you garden is growing well and healthily, you will enjoy some respite from the harsh weather your-self.
