

#### CEO COUNCIL MESSAGE

Welcome to the April 2023 edition of The Dust CEO Council Message Report that provides information for all residents regarding the Council ordinary meeting that was held on the 18th of March 2023 as well as the Health, Building and Town Planning Committee meeting and the Audit Committee meeting that were held on the same morning.

This section of The Dust is intended to provide a snapshot of the issues discussed at Councils Ordinary Meetings that are held each month. The unconfirmed minutes of Council Meetings are placed on the Council website as soon as possible within the prescribed time limit whereby they are confirmed at the next scheduled Council Meeting. Furthermore, items listed on the agenda when published for the community may not include all the items that were discussed at the Council Meeting, as provision is made for councillors and/or staff to introduce late items for consideration as permitted by legislation and Councils Standing Orders. Therefore, the following resolutions are only a summary extract of the full meeting agenda with the entire meeting proceedings being available in the official Council Minutes that are confirmed at the next meeting of Council.

#### <u>Items from the Shire of Meekatharra Health, Building & Planning Meeting 18 March 2023</u>

<u>Item 7.1.2 – Community Development & Services Manager's Report</u>

#### **Entry Statements**

The Meekatharra District High School created aboriginal artwork which has been forwarded to the design firm to incorporate into the overall entry statement. Design will be presented to Council for consideration and approval once received.

#### **Lions Park**

Design/Tender: Detailed/technical design by landscape architects is 95% complete. Funding: Westgold Resources committed to \$20k sponsorship (subject to sufficient other funding being received). Grant application for \$15k for Arts U15k grant in progress pending quotes from artists.

Other item details from the Community Development & Services Manager's Report can be found in the Minutes of the Health, Building & Planning Meeting. This meeting was also the first report presented by the Shire of East Pilbara health, building and planning staff under the new Shared Services Agreement between the Shire's of Meekatharra and East Pilbara.

#### <u>Items from the Shire of Meekatharra Audit Committee Meeting 18 March 2023</u>

#### <u>Item 3.1 – Compliance Audit Return 2022</u>

That the Committee recommend that Council adopt the attached Compliance Audit Return 2022 and submit it to the Director General, Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries by 31 March 2023.

The above resolution confirms Councils adoption of the 2022 Annual Compliance Audit Return as required by legislation.

#### <u>Items from the Shire of Meekatharra Ordinary Meeting 18 March 2023</u>

#### <u>Item 9.3.1 – Council Extraordinary Election</u>

Council instruct the CEO to seek approval from the Electoral Commissioner in accordance with section 4.17 (3) and (4A) for the vacancy of one councillor to remain unfilled until the ordinary elections scheduled for October 2023.

The above resolution was in response to no nominations being received as a councillor to fill the extraordinary vacancy. The CEO has now written to and received approval from the WA Electoral Commissioner to allow the vacancy to remain unfilled until the ordinary elections scheduled for the 21st of October 2023. At the ordinary election in October there will be four (4) ordinary vacancies for a four (4) year term and the extraordinary vacancy for a two (2) year term. The election in October will be held as an 'in person' election with the introduction of the Optional Preferential Voting (OPV) system. More information regarding the election will be provided through the Dust, Councils social media and the Notice Board as the election gets closer.

#### Item 11.1 – Mission Australia Lease – 64 Hill Street Meekatharra

That Council approve the Lease between the Shire of Meekatharra and Mission Australia for the premises located at 64 (Lot 5) Hill Street Meekatharra in accordance with the terms and conditions outlined in the Lease and approves the affixing of Councils Common Seal and execution of the Lease by the Chief Executive Officer and the Shire President.

The above resolution finalizes the lease arrangements between Mission Australia and Council for the premises located at 64 Hill Street Meekatharra that is currently used by Mission Australia as a short term domestic violence facility.

#### **Further Information Snippets**

• Wiluna Meekatharra Road (Goldfields Highway) – as advised in previous Dust editions, the Shire's of Meekatharra and Wiluna continue to lobby the Minister for Transport and Main Roads WA to complete sealing the remainder of the unsealed road section of the Goldfields Highway. A Petition to the WA Legislative Council closed in early March 2023 where just under 600 signatures were received. The Petition was then formally tabled in the WA Legislative Council and referred to the Standing Committee on the Environment and Public Affairs. The process now is for a formal submission to be made to the Committee for consideration whereby both Councils will request that a Public Inquiry be held. Both the Shire's of Meekatharra and Wiluna have received strong support from the Member for North West Central, Merome Beard MLA that has included asking several questions to the Minister responsible in the Legislative Assembly during Public Question Time.

The next Ordinary Meeting of Council is scheduled for Saturday the 22nd of April 2023 and the next CEO Council Message column will appear in the next edition of The Dust in early May.

The total solar eclipse is almost upon us!

With April, comes planning for not only the Eclipse but the Easter holidays.

Believe it or not, the reason the Easter date changes every year has a lot to do with astronomy!

Enjoy this special month when the world will watch as the Exmouth area disappears into the shadow of the Moon.

#### Before 6th April

Easter Sunday is deemed to be the first Sunday after the full Moon, following the March Equinox. This year the March Equinox was on 21st March. The full Moon after this date is on the 6th of April and therefore Easter Sunday is the following Sunday which is the 9th of April 2023! Enjoy your Easter Eggs!

#### Before 9th April

For Easter stargazing, enjoy the almost full Moon rise stunningly over the eastern horizon at around 8pm onwards. It will appear brilliant and very large.

#### Before 20th April

Wes<mark>t Austra</mark>lians have the privilege of viewing a Total Solar Eclipse from 11.29.41am on 20th April. Totality will only occur in Exmouth, however WA will experience a partial solar eclipse which will still be amazing.

#### Before 23rd April

What a stargazing view! Look to the west just after sunset on the 23rd to see the beautiful crescent Moon, just below the bright planet Venus and the constellation of Taurus all grouped together!

Stay warm Meeka ~


## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT Project Updates

#### Streetscape Upgrade

It's happening! After many years of community calls for upgrading the tired looking median strip in the middle of Main Street, it's finally happening. Previous attempts of beautifying the strip with greenery have unfortunately not lasted so it's now getting a complete do-over.

After Easter, commencing on Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> April, traffic management will be in place for approximately one week while the three median strips on Main Street as well as the traffic island on Savage Street get demolished and rebuilt with renewed kerbing and an upgraded concrete infill.

An additional pedestrian crossover will also be established in the centre of the strip (between Yulella Vision and the Chemist).



Traffic lights will be used during construction (since we're not used to seeing them here in Meeka: red means stop, green means go (a) and will at times reduce traffic to single lane to allow the concrete truck and kerbing machine to do their job. Parking will also at times be impacted.

We ask for and appreciate the community's patience and cooperation with regards to the traffic restrictions.

Once the concrete has fully cured, another team will come up in May to apply the paver pattern look and the mural artwork. Traffic management will once again be in place during this week.

The murals will be applied via stencils based on artwork created by Ando (following the art competition that was open to all local artists). The artwork's colours and pictures reflect the community feedback gathered in November/December last year and depict the three main pillars of Meekatharra's heritage: Indigenous, Pastoral and Mining. The artwork is big and bold and will look great once stencilled on to the new median strip.

The murals will also be shown and explained on interpretive signage on the footpath and at the visitor centre so that the community and tourists can view it in more detail and learn more about the process and Meeka's heritage.

The project is being delivered in partnership with RAC, through its Reconnect WA initiative, which aims to create vibrant streets and public spaces for Western Australians to interact and connect with each other. Other elements of the project include the improved pedestrian crossings and street furniture to improve amenity (such as shaded seating, bike parking, greenery, and/or lighting).

#### **Lions Park**

Council in December approved the design concept for the Lions Park development. Since then the Landscape Architect and staff have been working on fine tuning the technical details of the park and finding grant funding to let the project become reality.

A big shout out and Thank You to Greenmount Resources, Westgold Resources and Corsign for their confirmed fiscal and/or in-kind support for the project! We really appreciate your commitment to the Meekatharra community and this space we're creating. Another couple of funding applications are in the pipeline and are awaiting approval. In the meantime, the technical specs will be completed and presented as a package to Council in April to formally go to tender.

The design fulfils a lot of the community's wishes as shown in our community consultation – the park will feature grass to sit on or kick a footy around, shade, barbecue, drinking water, trees, a slide, little kids nature play area, lighting, a yarning circle, native plantings and locally created artwork (watch this space – there'll be opportunities for co-creating the artwork as well as the bushtucker areas!)

Would you like to know more about the details of the park? Do you hold knowledge with regards to traditional uses for local plants (bush tucker or bush medicine)? Svenja from the Shire would love to catch up with you.



#### **Entry Statement**

The Meeka District Highschool Students have created very beautiful and meaningful artwork to be incorporated into the Town Entry Statement, in line with the Barndi Nyooda (the Community Wellness Plan from the Meekatharra Aboriginal Reference Group).

The artwork represents the two traditional owner groups around Meeka, the Ngoonooru Wadjarri and Yugunga-Nya peoples, the families of Meekatharra, the students who created this artwork, the mines around Meeka, the granites and the hills. The original painting will be displayed at the Visitor

Centre so the community and tourists alike can recognise the painting as part of the Entry Statement they drove past on the way into town, marvel at the detail and learn about Meeka's people and landscape.

Additional to this artwork, the Entry Statement will also highlight the pastoral and mining significance of the area as well as some of our local flora and fauna. Without giving too much away, it'll look great.

The Entry Statement concept and locations now need to be approved by Main Roads (as they'll be on the Great Northern Highway road reserve so they need to meet certain requirements such as letter size, offset from the road etc).

Once that's approved we can get the ball rolling with the manufacture of the signs and getting them on the ground later this year. It all takes time but, having seen the design, it'll be worth the wait!

#### **Swimming Pool Repairs and Upgrade**

With the last lot of tiling having been done over 20 years ago, the Swimming Pool is showing its age, especially above the water line where years of hard water have left their mark. Not only does it look a bit crusty and old, missing tiles can also be a health and injury risk (think stubbed toes and nooks and crannies for bacteria to hide out).

This will change! Council at their March Ordinary Council Meeting approved a tender for Dyson Pools Pty Ltd to undertake repair and upgrade works to the pool this off-season. The bulk heads will get a do-over, tiles on the end walls and steps will be replaced, any underlying concrete issues will be corrected, the floor will be resealed and repainted, the handrails will get a polish, the toddler pool will get a complete re-tile and – most exciting – there'll be new splash toys! The old car, whilst loved by many kids over the years, hasn't been splashing for a while so it'll be replaced with a mushroom as well as a little fun water cannon where the shower feature currently is. It'll look brand spanking new and give this well used and appreciated community asset renewed life. We will work hard on getting it ready for the next pool season on 1 October 2023.

This upgrade is partly funded by the Department of Local Government, Sport & Cultural Industry's "Community Sporting and Recreation Facilities Fund" – thank you for enabling this project!













#### Media Release

#### Petition Outcome for Sealing the Goldfields Highway

The Shire Presidents of Meekatharra and Wiluna have continued to lobby the WA State Government to support the sealing of the remaining 124 km of unsealed road between Wiluna and Meekatharra. The condition of the unsealed road continues to deteriorate with vehicle accidents also being an unfortunate regular occurrence.

The Meekatharra and Wiluna Shires commenced a Petition process to the WA Parliament Legislative Council Upper House in early March this year.

The Petition is a request for action and was open to any citizen or resident, or group of citizens or residents of WA, to petition the Legislative Council to take action. Signing of the Petition was either by hard copies of the petition being available in the towns of Meekatharra or Wiluna, and by e-petition directly to the WA Legislative Council.

The introduction of the Petition process to the WA Legislative Council was facilitated by the Hon Colin de Grussa MLC, Nationals WA and Member for Agricultural Region with support from the Member for North West Central the Hon Mem Beard MLA. The Hon Colin de Grussa MLC will also formally table the Petition by reading a summary of the Petition to the Upper House. At the close of the Petition process on the 1<sup>st</sup> of March 2023, a total of 594 petitions were received.

Once formally tabled in the Upper House, the Petition is referred to the Environment and Public Affairs Committee for consideration and reporting. In considering the petition, the Committee usually seeks the advice of the member who presented the petition, the person who promoted it and the Minister(s) in whose area of responsibility the subject matter of the petition falls. At this point the Principal Petitioner will be requested to provide more information about the intent of the Petition, such as why they support the Petition in a formal submission. Evidence of the road condition and regular vehicle accidents on the road will be provided to the Committee as part of supporting the submission process. The Principal Petitioner and the Shire's of Meekatharra and Wiluna will then be advised of the outcome of the Committee's consideration of a petition and the Committee may report on the petition to the Legislative Council.

The Shire's of Meekatharra and Wiluna have long been concerned that the remaining unsealed gravel section of the State Goldfields Highway (Meekatharra Wiluna Road) continues to create road safety issues to both the travelling community and freight transport operators. The Petition process is therefore intended that the Environment and Public Affairs Committee make recommendations for the government to seriously consider the sealing of the remaining section of the unsealed Goldfields Highway without delay.

Both Shire Presidents of Meekatharra and Wiluna are grateful to those persons who signed the petition in show of support to the government for maintaining the safety standards of our regional road network by sealing the remainder of the Goldfields Highway.

On April 20, 2023, Western Australia will witness a rare celestial event, a total solar eclipse. The eclipse is expected to begin at around 10 am and will last for approximately two hours. During a total solar eclipse, the moon passes directly in front of the sun, casting a shadow on the earth and causing the sky to darken. This unique phenomenon is a once-in-a-lifetime experience.

So come and join us at Peace Gorge from 10 am - 2 pm for a day of fun in the Shadows and Sunshine. Create some art, have some fun and games and a feed!

It is important to note that viewing a solar eclipse requires proper eye protection, so it is recommended to use certified eclipse glasses or other specialized equipment to ensure safe viewing. The shire will have some protective eyeglasses for people to view the eclipse.





#### **COMMUNITY HAPPENINGS**

#### Cemeteries Heritage Project

The Shire's Cemeteries Heritage Project is continuing.

Helene Bartleson came back to Meeka last month, this time accompanied by heritage stonemason Nick Lukacs who assessed a number of old headstones at the various cemeteries in our vast shire. Guided once again by trusted and knowledgeable Shire Rural Roads Supervisor Stephen Hoare, the team along with Felicity and Kelvin set out to the cemeteries to get to work.

The Shire's goal is to establish a Cemeteries Management Plan which will apply to both the current cemetery as well as the five closed cemeteries: Nannine, Gabanintha, Peak Hill, Abbotts and Kyarra. The plan will address the physical aspect of the cemeteries such as drainage, fencing and access in addition to assisting with the preservation of Meekatharra's rich and diverse heritage. With graves dating back to the gold rush era of the late 1800s, many old stories and headstones are being dusted off and captured in the Shire's records. Whether it's prospectors, indigenous people, pastoralists. Chinese migrants, afghan cameleers: if there's someone buried (no matter who) we'll try and find their story and preserve the site.

We held two community engagement sessions where people were able to learn about the project as well as pick up handy tips about headstone care.

Do you have family buried in Meeka?

Do the graves have headstones that may get covered in dust every now and again and need a bit of TLC?

Everything you need to clean headstones is readily available at the Meeka IGA. Nothing fancy needed. Never use chemicals or abrasive tools – just a soft cloth or soft brush and water.

Check out the handy "How to Clean a Headstone" guide on the next page.

Helene also got the chance to speak with locals about some of the "mystery" graves where historic records are a bit patchy (or often non-existent) – this is where local knowledge is absolutely crucial.

One of the comments we previously heard was "it's a shame youse didn't do this years ago when our parents were still alive – they knew so much more" which highlighted exactly why we're doing this – let's do it now before another generation, and with them more knowledge, passes.

On the topic of cultural diversity, the Shire has the opportunity to amend its Burial Register and burial application forms going forward. Cultural background, language/dialects, kinship/mob, place of birth and whether it's an On-Country or Secret/Sacred burial can all be captured – if this is what the community wants. Conversations held with a number of long time locals have indicated that this would be a welcome addition. We seek your feedback on this – shall we give people the option to capture more cultural information in our burial register?

Helene and Nick will be back in September to undertake some historic headstone restorations, follow on detailed surveys that will be conducted in the meantime (e.g. drone surveys that will reveal unmarked graves in/near the old cemeteries) and will be free to catch up more with the community.

#### HOW TO CLEAN A HEADSTONE

#### Avoid Damage

- NEVER use chemicals, detergents or solvents to clean headstones. Use only clean water.
- 2. NEVER use abrasive pads, metal brushes, scrapers or other metal tools.
- NEVER use high pressure hosing, long-handled or heavy-duty brooms.Always clean gently by hand.
- 4. **NEVER** use paint or sealants to coat grave stones. They seal in moisture which damages the stone.

#### **Headstone Cleaning Kit**

- 1. Plastic clip-lid bucket
- 2. Spray bottle or slow flow hose
- Different sized brushes with soft natural or nylon bristles. If the bristles are too harsh against your skin, don't use them on headstones.
- 4. Micro fibre cloths or mitt-some textured for cleaning, some smooth for wiping dry.
- 5. Plastic spatula
- 6. Rubber gloves

#### Hand Clean a Headstone Step-by-Step.

- 1. Work on one area at a time.
- 2. Wet the area with a little clean water.
- 3. Clean with firm even strokes using a damp micro fibre cloth.
- 4. Continue using a cloth or soft brush and water by turns until the area is clean.
- For stubborn dirt, don't scrub harder. Soak the area first and use more water as you clean
- 6. Work gently on and around photos and lettering with a soft toothbrush.
- 7. Use a plastic spatula to gently remove candle wax etc
- 8. In extreme climates, **clean regularly** to prevent damage from salt, dust, candle or joss smoke, plant stains and animal or bird droppings
- Prevent stains and damage from acids, oils and smoke by using a portable altar or burner
- Protect floors and stone altars using disposable cloths and plates to hold drink, fruit
   food offerings.
- 11. If water doesn't work, ask for further advice at the Shire Office.

Follow washing instructions after each use to keep cloths in good condition.



#### What made you stay here?


By the time my brother had passed, I already bought a house, and met my wonderful partner here.



#### INTERVIEW WITH A VOLUNTEER

#### **Peter Clare**

Volunteering for St. John Ambulance and Meekatharra Golf Club

#### Where do you volunteer?

Currently with St John Ambulance and with the Meekatharra Golf Club. In the past I have also volunteered on the Community Resource Centre Committee and for the Meekatharra Dirt Kart Club.

#### How long have you been volunteering?

I started with the Ambos in 2006, just after I came to town. I joined the Golf Club committee in 2010 and then the CRC and Dirt Club was about five years ago for a couple of years.

What made you start volunteering?
I wanted to contribute to the community.

#### What do you do as part of your role?

With St John, I'm a Volunteer Ambulance Officer. I drive the ambulance and assist the attendants.

With the Golf Club, I'm the Captain. I do the handicaps, tally up the scores, determine the winners, receipt and allocate playing groups, help out around the club with maintenance etc, assist in the running of the Meeka Open.

#### What do you like most about it?

Making a difference in the community and being engaged in activities which provides a sense of accomplishment and joy.

Specifically with St John, it's great to be able to provide successful outcomes in priority situations, and with the Golf Club it's great to be able to assist with running a successful and smooth event such as the Meeka Golf Open.

#### What's the worst aspect?

As an ambo, the emotional fallout in the community following an unsuccessful outcome to a life threatening situation can be difficult. Because it's such a small community it's very close (not like in the city where it would be very anonymous and you can just go home and never see the family/place/situation again). We are expected to and do rock up to traumatic scenes and we hold it together and do our job professionally, but we are also humans underneath that uniform. We do get training but it doesn't necessarily prepare you for the real thing. Some community members say things like "it's your job" not realising we're just volunteers. And whilst we do get psychological wellbeing support from St John, it means so much more when a community member genuinely checks in with us as a first responder and asks if we're OK.

#### Do you have any interesting/funny/fascinating stories you can share?

The most bizarre moment was when a patient, years ago, said to me that I smelled lovely and then proceeded to lick my face. That, I can assure you, does not normally happen.

With the Golf Club, there are lots of stories but.... what happens on the golf course stays on the golf course;)

## What's something people don't know or should know about volunteering with the Ambos or Golf Club or volunteering in general?

The Golf Club is slowly diminishing. Without new members it may cease to operate in the not so distant future.

With St John, I really value the sense of security that the first aid and emergency knowledge and experience gives you. Whether that's just around home for first aid, or when you're away and travelling on the road – it's great to know that you can help people.

#### Do you need more members or volunteers? How do people go about signing up?

YES!

If people are interested in the ambos (I promise, getting your face licked is not part of the normal duties!) they can just rock up to our fortnightly training sessions at the Subcentre in Hill Street, every second Wednesday at 5.30pm.

If people are keen to join the golf club, they can message me on social media and I can introduce them to the club and game.

#### Give pet scams paws for thought

Cute photos of puppies and kittens have been used by scammers for years to dupe prospective pet buyers out of their hard-earned money and it's only getting worse.

In Western Australia last year, our WA ScamNet team received 114 reports of pet scams, with 75 victims losing more than \$216,000 – a three-fold increase on both the losses and victim numbers reported five years earlier in 2017.

Most pet scams begin with online searches for animal breeders, or advertisements that appear on online marketplaces and social media, with images or videos often stolen from legitimate websites.

Although the ad may suggest the seller is local, when contacted they will say they are outside WA or located remotely and the animal needs to be transported. This tactic is used to get you to pay more money for fake shipping fees, airfares or travel insurance.

The biggest red-flag that you're dealing with a scammer is the method of payment, with money sent via bank transfer unlikely to be recovered. Don't be fooled by Australian bank account details either, as scammers are known to use money mules to look more legitimate.

For this reason, we recommend only paying via credit card or a secure payment platform like PayPal as there's potential to get your money back if the animal never turns up.

Other warning signs are limited contact, no address details on the website and false claims of being a registered breeder that can easily be verified.

With so many downsides to buying a pet online, it is generally safer for consumers to shop locally so they can personally inspect the animal and meet its owner. Consider going through legitimate breeding organisations such as <a href="Dogs West">Dogs West</a> or the <a href="Cat Owners Association">Cat Owners Association</a> to verify breeder information and registered contact details, or give serious thought to adopting through a shelter or rescue centre.

#### Spotlight on hidden fees

Every cent counts during the current cost of living crisis, so it can come as a shock to discover extra fees or charges have been added to a purchase before checkout, or tacked on to the receipt after paying.

Hidden fees may come in a number of disguises, so it's important to know what to look for and understand your rights to avoid spending more than you'd initially planned.

Pre-selected extras are becoming more common as food delivery apps and self-service QR codes in restaurants replace ordering in-person, or when events and flights are booked online. These apps and websites can be set to automatically charge a tip or for other extras, unless the customer removes these options before paying.

Under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL), businesses are allowed to add pre-selected tips and optional charges to your bill – in a practice known as 'drip-pricing' – but only if the additional prices are disclosed at the beginning of the purchasing process.

To avoid accidentally leaving a tip, or being stung for other add-ons, it's important to keep an eye out for any preselected extras included in the total price and deselect anything that's not wanted before making payment.

If you are misled into paying an optional charge, then raise this with the business and request a pro-rata refund to the value of that added charge.

Another common issue we hear about is payment surcharges for simply using your credit, debit or EFTPOS card, rather than cash.

Card surcharges are permitted under the ACL, however the fee must only reflect what it actually costs the business to process the payment, such as bank fees or terminal costs. If a business charges a payment surcharge, it must be able to prove the costs it is based on.

Should a business not accept cash – or fail to provide another way for consumers to pay without incurring a surcharge – the fee must then be included in the total cost.

If you believe a business is breaching the rules on hidden charges, it's best to broach it with them first. Should negotiations fail, contact Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54, or consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au

What is fatigue?

What is fatigue?

Fatigue is not the same as feeling just tired or sleepy, although there is a link. When you feel fatigued, you have no energy, to the point that it affects your daily living, and your mental and emotional state. Fatigue is a very common complaint. Physical or psychological conditions, and sometimes a combination of the two, can cause fatigue.

What symptoms are related to fatigue?

Symptoms of and associated with fatigue includes; feeling very tired, growing tired quickly after you start an activity, lacking motivation, problems with concentration and memory, slower reaction times, poor mood, problems focusing, problems with hand-eye coordination and increased chance of taking risks or making errors.

Fatigue often gets worse gradually. You might not realize how much it is affecting you until you think about all the things you could do previously.

What causes fatigue?

Fatigue is usually caused by stress, anxiety, depression, viruses such as the flu or COVID-19 or sleep problems. Some medications may also cause you to feel fatigued. Sometimes fatigue is a symptom of a physical condition such as:

anaemia, sleep apnoea, underactive thyroid — when you have too little of the thyroid hormone  ${\bf x}$ thyroxine, coeliac disease, chronic syndrome, diabetes, glandular fever, restless legs syndrome, cancer, heart disease, problems with the liver or kidneys, multiple sclerosis and other illnesses.

**How is fatigue treated?** 

To find out what is causing your fatigue, your doctor will ask you about any other symptoms and do a full examination. They may order blood tests or imaging tests, depending on what they think your condition might be.

Treatment will depend on the condition that is causing your fatigue. Sometimes, after treatment, you will feel better almost straight away.

However, it might take several weeks for your fatigue to lessen. Mindfulness, meditation, yoga and cognitive behavioural therapy are non-medical treatments that may be effective for some people to treat fatigue.

How can I manage fatigue myself?

You should make sure you have good quality sleep to help you manage fatigue. Ensure you go to bed at the same time each night and stick to healthy sleep habits.

Eating a <u>healthy diet</u> and doing regular <u>physical</u> <u>activity</u> will also help improve your sleep and lessen fatigue. Eat small, frequent meals throughout the day with plenty of fresh fruit and vegetables. Avoid junk food, and try to avoid alcohol and caffeine since these may affect your sleep.



### **WOMEN'S MONTH**

As we celebrate International Women's Day and Women's Month, we want to highlight the importance of Sisterhood, the harmful effects of bullying, and the inspiration we can draw from inspirational Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women.

In Session 3 of the Young Women's Group, we focused on these themes and saw the young women engage well and share their thoughts and experiences. The session started with a fun team-building game that required the young women to work together and highlighted the importance of collaboration. We then discussed the harm caused by spreading rumours and the importance of verifying information before believing it.

The young women then spoke about the meaning of Sisterhood and the qualities that make a good friend. They also talked about the importance of being vulnerable and recognising when it's okay to ask for help from trusted individuals. The topic of bullying was explored through the "Be Deadly Series" game on Cyber-bullying, which led to a discussion on the effects of bullying, e-safety, and ways to help someone who is being bullied.

We discussed inspirational Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women, and how most of the women we discussed were all from a remote, regional or rural community. This led to a discussion about setting goals, believing in yourself and not giving up on your dreams. The young women then shared their goals for the next week or five years, which ranged from becoming a doctor, a mechanic, or a pilot, to getting a job at the mines.

As we wrapped up the session, we reminded the young women that they can achieve anything they set their minds to and quoted, "Believe You Can and You Will." We hope this session has inspired the young women to continue supporting each other, standing up against bullying, and pursuing their dreams with confidence and determination.

Let's continue to support and uplift each other, and remember that together, we can achieve great things.



### **Understanding Aphids**

Aphids are small, soft-bodied, sap sucking insects which belong to the order Hemiptera. Let's examine some unique biological features about aphids to better understand why they are so difficult to control.

- Host plant range: Many species of aphids can feed on a wide range of host plants, which makes it difficult to control infestations in mixed plantings. These aphids are referred to as 'polyphagous' and includes the green peach aphid which feeds on a wide range of crops including vegetables, fruit trees, and ornamental plants.
- Rapid reproduction: Aphids can reproduce asexually through a process called parthenogenesis, where females give birth to live young without mating with a male. This allows aphid populations to grow rapidly under favourable conditions, and some species produce 20+ generations a season.
- Developmental plasticity & dispersal: Aphids can produce alates (winged aphids) in response to changes in environmental conditions. A drop in food quality, overcrowding or increased

- predation pressure can alter their development and produce winged individuals to aid in aphid dispersal.
- Ant mutualism: Some species of aphids have a mutualistic relationship with ants, which can protect them from predators and parasitoids. This can make it difficult to control aphid populations without also addressing the ant presence.
- Insecticide resistance: Some aphid populations have developed resistance to commonly used insecticides, which can make control even more challenging.

Understanding these factors can help you develop effective strategies for managing aphids. This may include cultural practices like removing infested plants, biological control methods like introducing natural predators or parasitoids, and careful use of insecticides that are effective against the specific aphid species present.

If you don't recognise the aphid you are trying to control, please report it.





### **Easter Chick Pops**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 150 g white chocolate melts
- 100 g white marshmallows
- 10 M&Ms
- 2 red licorice twists
- 1 black icing pen

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Melt white chocolate in a bowl placed over a saucepan of simmering water. Alternatively, melt in short bursts in the microwave.
- 2. Push marshmallows onto the icy pole sticks.

  One by one, dip into the melted chocolate, allowing excess to drip off.
- 3. Cut M&M's in half with a sharp knife. Cut 4mm slices of licorice and then cut those across into half moons. Working quickly before the chocolate has completely set, press a half M&M into the front of the marshmallow and a licorice piece onto the top. Refrigerate to set completely.
- 4. Once set, using an icing pen, squeeze a small amount onto each marshmallow to form the eyes. Enjoy!

### Lemony Potato Salad

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 2 1/2 lb. baby potatoes (about 30)
- Kosher salt
- Pepper
- 1/4 c. sour cream
- 2 tbsp. mayonnaise
- 1 tbsp. whole-grain mustard
- 1 tsp. grated lemon zest
- 3 tbsp. fresh lemon juice
- 2 stalks celery, finely chopped
- 1/4 c. fresh chopped chives

#### **METHOD**

- 1. STEP 1Place potatoes in a large, wide pot, cover with cold water, and bring to a boil. Add 2 tsp salt, reduce heat, and simmer until potatoes are just tender, 10 to 15 minutes. Drain and run under cold water to cool.
- 2.STEP 2Meanwhile, in a large bowl, whisk together sour cream, mayonnaise, mustard, lemon zest and juice, and 1/2 teaspoon each salt and pepper; stir in celery. Halve potatoes if large, then add to dressing and gently toss to combine. Fold in chives.



#### Mushroom Risotto

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 8 c. low-sodium chicken or vegetable broth
- 1 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil
- 1 onion, finely chopped
- 2 tbsp. butter, divided
- · 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 lb. button mushrooms, sliced
- 1 bay leaf
- 4 sprigs thyme, leaves removed
- kosher salt
- · Freshly ground black pepper
- 2 c. arborio rice
- 1/2 c. white wine
- 1 c. freshly grated Parmesan
- 3/4 c. frozen peas, thawed
- 2 tbsp. chopped fresh parsley

#### **METHODS**

#### Step 1

In a medium saucepan over medium heat, bring chicken broth to a simmer. Reduce heat to low.

Step 2

In a large pot or Dutch oven, heat oil. Add onion and cook, stirring often, until translucent, about 5 minutes. Add 1 tablespoon butter, garlic, mushrooms, bay leaf and thyme. Cook until the mushrooms have softened and are golden, about 4 more minutes, then season with salt and pepper. Remove mixture from the pot.

Step 3

Melt remaining tablespoon butter in the pot and add the arborio rice, stirring quickly. Cook until the grains are well-coated and smell slightly toasty, about 2 minutes. Add the wine and cook until the wine has mostly absorbed.

Step 4

With a ladle, add about 1 cup hot broth. Stirring often, cook until the rice has mostly absorbed liquid. Add remaining broth about 1 cup at a time, continuing to allow the rice to absorb each addition of broth before adding more. Stir often and cook until the risotto is al dente and creamy, not mushy. (You might not need all the broth.)

Step 5

Add the mushroom mixture back into the rice.


Step 6

Stir in Parmesan and peas then garnish with parsley. Serve warm.






