CEO COUNCIL MESSAGE

Welcome to the July 2023 edition of The Dust CEO Council Message Report that provides information for all residents regarding the Council ordinary meeting that was held on the 24th of June 2023 as well as the Health, Building and Town Planning Committee meeting held on the same morning.

This section of The Dust is intended to provide a snapshot of the issues discussed at Councils Ordinary Meetings that are held each month. The unconfirmed minutes of Council Meetings are placed on the Council website as soon as possible within the prescribed time limit whereby they are confirmed at the next scheduled Council Meeting. Furthermore, items listed on the agenda when published for the community may not include all the items that were discussed at the Council Meeting, as provision is made for councillors and/or staff to introduce late items for consideration as permitted by legislation and Councils Standing Orders. Therefore, the following resolutions are only a summary extract of the full meeting agenda with the entire meeting proceedings being available in the official Council Minutes that are confirmed at the next meeting of Council.

Items from the Shire of Meekatharra Health, Building & Planning Meeting 24 June 2023

Item 7.1.1 – Principal Environmental Health Officer and Building Surveyor's Report In accordance with the shared services agreement between the Shire of Meekatharra and the Shire of East Pilbara, the report provided a summary of building, planning and environmental health matters for May 2023. This included all activities, the progress of ongoing situations and concerns related to the required services raised by the Shire of East Pilbara. Further detail is available in the minutes of the Environmental Health Officer and Building Surveyor's Report.

Item 7.1.2 – Community Development & Services Manager's Report

Entry Statements

Council is awaiting guotes for the concrete work required prior to installation of the signage.

Lions Park

Tenders for the construction of the Lions Park design closed on 26th of May 2023 and a report was listed in the Council meeting full agenda for consideration.

Median Strip

Application of spray on pavers and mural artwork completed in May 2023. Positive feedback received from community. Haul pack oversize loads leave rubber wheel marks on surface. The CEO has contacted Main Roads WA to discuss potential diversion of traffic escort guided oversize loads on north bound lane only, in order to reduce rubber marks. The surface can be pressure washed with CT18 water based truck degreaser/cleaner.

As part of the street furniture for the main street the bike racks have arrived. Seating has been ordered with dispatch date in August 2023. Drinking water fountain to be ordered and installed.

The BBQ for the swimming pool complex has arrived and the concrete pad has been prepared. Works to install the BBQ planned within the next month.

Other item details from the Community Development & Services Manager's Report can be found in the Minutes of the Health, Building & Planning Meeting.

Items from the Shire of Meekatharra Ordinary Meeting 24 June 2023

<u>Item 9.3.1 – Mining Tenement Applications</u>

That Council approve the following Applications from:

- Mining Tenement Application for Mining Lease 52/1085 and Tengraph Map from Hetherington Exploration & Mining Title Services on behalf of Norwest Minerals Ltd situated on Peak Hill.
- 2. Miscellaneous Licence application 51/130 and Tengraph Map from Tenement Solutions on behalf of Australian Vanadium Limited.
- 3. Miscellaneous Licence application 51/131 and Tengraph Map from Tenement Solutions on behalf of Australian Vanadium Limited.

Council considers mining applications received for the district on a monthly basis.

Item 13.2 - Request for Tender 2022/23 - 6 - Lions Park Development Project

That Council accepts the tender submitted by Ligna Construction for RFT 2022/23-6 Lions Park Development as the most advantageous tender, subject to successful negotiation of project staging and cost/scope reduction to meet 2023/24 budget allocations.

The above recommendation lapsed based on the cost being prohibitive. Council requested that staff review the project and break it down into in stages. This approach will enable Shire staff and Community members to undertake the majority of the work required. In this regard, the project is in principle still accepted albeit not at the total cost as recommended by the tenderer. Budget allocation will be made annually to undertake identified components of the project. For example, in the current budget, allocation has already been made for seating and benches.

Further Information Snippets

- Annual 2023/24 Budget the 2023/24 Council budget process is nearing completion and its adoption is planned for the Council meeting on 22nd of July 2023.
- Cemeteries Management Plan as previously advised the next scheduled visit by Councils Heritage Consultant and Stonemason is early September. Part of this visit will include educational sessions for the community regarding the correct method of cleaning headstones – that is, by not using abrasive materials and chemicals. Advertising for the community workshops will occur in the August and September 2023 editions of The Dust.
- Landor Meekatharra Road Sealing sealing of a further 4 kms of the Landor Meekatharra was undertaken by Bitutek in June. There is now approximately 37.2 kms of the road remaining to be sealed that will see the entire Landor Meekatharra Road being sealed from the Meekatharra townsite to the Shire border with the Shire of Upper Gascoyne. Council will continue sourcing funding opportunities to assist in totally sealing the entire road network.

The next Ordinary Meeting of Council is scheduled for Saturday the 22nd of July 2023 and the next CEO Council Message column will appear in the next edition of The Dust in early August. Until then bye for now!

Rigby and Eveanne

Long time residents of Meekatharra and 32 years of service with the Shire



Written & Interviewed by Larra Juab

This month, I had the honour to interview one of the most iconic couples here in Meeka, it is Eveanne and Rigby!

They have been with the shire since I99I and 2023, this year is their last year with us. I personally haven't met a lot of people that had the same job for more than 20 years with the same employer, which made me respect the level of commitment and love that they have with what they do!

I also got to know more about how Meekatharra was like back in the days, and so much more about how this couple have lived their lives here from being single, together, and having their own family.

I cannot wait for you to read about their story!

HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN IN MEEKA? & HOW DID YOU COME TO MEEKA?

RIGBY: I've lived in Meekatharra all my life. I was born and raised here but my wife, she's been here for 48 years.

EVEANNE: I came when I was 17. My mum, stepfather and I were here. I left Perth to come to Meekatharra because I couldn't get work in Perth when I left school. And I've been here ever since.

RIGBY: My parents came across Meekatharra from Wiluna back in 1941. They settled in Meekatharra, and all our family was born here, and Dad was a grocer at the Elders, the Elders was over the road, that's the IGA supermarket now. Went to school here as well, up until Year 10. There was no year 11 and 12. Everyone finished at Year 10, and that was the norm then back in those years. You just finished year 10 and got straight to work.

Interviewer: I am just curious, was Meeka busier before?

RIGBY: Back when I first left school, you know in the early 70s, Meekatharra was a thriving town with pastoral and mining. The mining had been here prior but it stopped, in the war years, and then it just started cranking up probably in the mid-70s again and yeah the mining came from about 78 or 77, and went right through to 97. So we had a 20-year run of it, which was pretty big. A lot of families are here because they all employed local people.

EVEANNE: A lot of the mines would only employ locals. They never had to fly in or fly out. So all the families were here. The kids all went to school. We had up to 300 children. Yeah, our kids went to school here. We have a daughter and two sons and they went to school here. One of our youngest sons ended up doing his last two,

year 9 and year 10, at an agriculture school down in Mullewa.

RIGBY: Tardin Agricultural School, shut down. It only went to Year 10. But it shut down a few years ago, probably 10 years ago. And then if they wanted to go on to Ag(Agricultural) school they went to Morawa from year 11 and 12. Or you could go to Morawa from year 7, or 8 if you wanted to, you could go right through. Wow. So there were quite a few Meeka kids left here and went to town. Well, the school had. Up here they had agriculture. They got a shearing shed and they, you know, they had all fruit trees and they had chickens and -

EVEANNE: And then they got taught to do horse riding. Our children all learned to ride horses. It was good!

RIGBY: They had a good agriculture school there. And you know, as I say, it only went to year 10. But it was good for the kids, all the kids learnt the basic stuff. Now you don't really get that, which is pretty sad. But unfortunately, if you haven't got families here with kids, well you haven't got anyone coming up through the ranks to support the school or anything like that, you know. That's true. It's just a sad part. And it affects the whole community.

Interviewer: Now, I know I am going off script but - as I am interviewing you as a couple, I am wondering how did you guys meet?

EVEANNE: It's quite funny, I arrived in Meekatharra and I can tell you the exact date right here on March the 10th 1975. I came in on the West Railbus and my mum and my stepfather were at the Meekatharra Hotel, mum was a barmaid. So I stayed there and I was sitting when I first came in and it was raining. That night Rigby and all his mates were playing pool and it was one of Rigby's good mates. It was his 18th. So they were all in the hotel and they were playing pool and I was sitting there watching

them. And that was the first time I got to meet Rigby. They asked me if I wanted a game of pool because I kept watching them. My stepfather, he's called a pool shark, he used to play a lot of pool and he was very good and at snooker. Very, very good and he taught me. They did not know what was coming. They all were sort of like having a bit of a snicker saying, you know, we'll beat her and I ended up beating them. And they said, oh, where did you learn to play pool? And I said, well, see the man sitting at the bar there. And they said, oh, Gardie, that was his nickname. And I said, yeah. And they said, do you know him? I said, that's my dad. And he taught me how to play pool. They got wiped, and we just started hanging around together and then we ended up going out and got engaged and we've been married 46 years.

RIGBY: We went together for a couple of years before we got engaged.

EVEANNE: 18 months, so almost 50 years in total. So we - and then we got a daughter. She's 46 this year, a son 43, and a son 39. They're all in Geraldton, that's why we are going, we have seven grandchildren and one step-granddaughter and we've got a great-grandchild as well.

We catch up with them quite a lot every time we go over there in Gero. Some of the folks in Meeka have shifted to Geraldton, and so it's good because we do a big catchup a couple of times a year, and we all go out for dinner, and it's really good. We call it the mini-Meekatharra. It's good to know that there's still a community outside of Meeka. It's such a unique experience living here.

What were you doing here in Meeka?

RIGBY: I've worked in quite a few different jobs. I worked as I say, over at Elders for a few years and then I went working for the Main Roads. Just local like from here to Mount Newman, replacing guide posts and patching roads and things like that. When they first put the bitumen strip, because the bitumen used to stop 40 k's north of here and it was gravel all the way to Newman and Hedland then. So once they put the first bitumen seal on back in 78 or something, I worked with the Main Roads and then I worked with the state battery. I worked there before we got married and then yeah I went to the mine.

I worked at the mine with Whim Creek for six and a half years. I done a few different jobs there in the gold room and pouring gold there and I worked as a loader operator feeding the crusher and yeah, and then I looked after all their water. Their pumps and bores I used to look after all that for them and then I went to Belway's for a trucking company for a while a couple of years. In 1991 we got the job up here as a contract.

EVEANNE: 32 years we've done this job for.

RIGBY: So we got it as a 3-year contract, that's how it first started. And um, yeah, 3 years led to 32. But, I really, I still enjoy my job. And the wife, she's done the cleaning there and looks after all that side of it and looks after the books of course and yeah but it's been a good journey and it's sad to leave really but it's gonna move on.

EVEANNE: Yeah I've had quite a few jobs, worked in hotels, housemaiding, cleaning and that sort of stuff, waitressing and you know the Royal Mail, the Meeka, the Auski. I've done all the hotels. Oh there used to be a telephone exchange. The telephone exchange that's in the library. Where you answer the calls, like before

you had mobile phones. Before it went automatic in 1980. But prior to that, people used to have a little hand sack and they'd ring it. And it would drop her down a little shutter. I'll show you in the library it actually is there. And then we used to answer the calls and we'd put them through to someone else. So if you wanted to ring the Shire well you just ring the telephone exchange and it goes through to the exchange and the shutter will drop down and you'd say I'd like to place a call to Meekatharra Shire so we would put you through to the call and you could talk. And then if you say if you rang Perth it used to be three minutes intervals so, every three minutes we would go on and say, it's been three minutes are you extending? all the time and people used to get charged. So then you'd get a docket and that was at the post office. So then I was at the Lloyd's supermarket. I was there for some time. There was a big supermarket. He had not only the grocery, but he also had a dress shop, he had the hardware and he had a gardening section. From the post office right through to the chemist was all Llovds.

RIGBY: The old section isn't open like it is now. That old section is still separate. The front's still there.

EVEANNE: But yeah the whole thing was as I say it was the grocery news agency and then in the middle section was the dress shop and then the hardware and the gardening section. I worked in all the departments. Then after that I went to Woolworths, well first of all it was Elders, then it went to Woolworths, then it went to Farmer Jacks and now it's IGA. And I've worked in all of that, apart from IGA. And then I got a job at the CRC, Community Resource Centre, which is next door, for 10 years. I was the manager of the Westpac Bank. So the only places I think are the hospital and the school where I haven't worked. I've had some really good jobs. And as I say, we've had this job for 32 years. And it's been really good. But while I was doing the cleaning, I had the CRC and the bank job. And the Department of Transport, I used to do the Department of Transport as well. I finished with them in 2019. And they have asked me a couple of times to go back, but no. I left there and said, no. I'd rather concentrate on this. And now we're leaving, so yeah. It's been good. Met a lot of people, and made a lot of friends.

Interviewer: You've seen Meeka from like when it's very busy, now it's quiet.

EVEANNE: We've seen the good, the bad and the ugly, as we say.

RIGBY: We've seen it quiet, then we've seen it get busy, and now we've seen it sort of, the last probably, the last since about 99 it's just been a slow decline once the mines went and all the people went out of town and they put in fly in, fly out well that's that buggers every little town or every town. People don't stay here if you haven't got families here.

EVEANNE: We lost roughly around 400 people when the mines changed to FIFO (fly in fly out). And we saw that because 90% of those people were friends of ours.

RIGBY: And you had to leave 'cause there was no work in town. A few die-hards like us, we had this job so it didn't really affect us. Otherwise, we would have had to go, if I was still in the mining, we would have to shift to somewhere else. When we first went up there, our youngest son just started year one. There's what, eight,

And then the kids stayed here and got jobs. And then joined too. So it was sort of a family thing. they ended up going about 2005 - 2007 or something like that?

EVEANNE: It would have been because the oldest granddaughter was born in 2004 and they were both was born in Geraldton, one son was born in Perth, and here then. So it would have been 2005, 2006.

RIGBY: They all worked here. The daughter worked at of the last children to be born at the Meekatharra Woolworths and, and done a bit of extra shifts as a Hospital. barman in the pub just to get a few extra bob. Son's worked for the Shire, and Centurion Transport and the youngest son did an apprenticeship as a fitter and machinist. He did his apprenticeship here for four years and then once he got his ticket, they shifted to Geraldton.

What will you be missing from Meeka?

RIGBY: I'll just miss the comradery, you know? You can go to the pub and have a beer, you can have a yap and talk about anything or nothing really, I'll just miss the general people, you know? Everyone sort of knows each other, and you can't do that in a big city. Well, Gero is not a big city, but it's a big country town and you miss that

EVEANNE: We've still got a lot of friends here and we will miss them. But, you know, it's time really for us to move on. We want to do a little bit of traveling before we get any older, but we will be back. Yeah, we'll come back and say goodbye. It's going to be sad the day we drive out of Meeka. It will be sad.

INTERVIEWER: That is right, in a smaller town like this. you get to make friends quite easily.

RIGBY: Yeah, and everyone talks to each other. Everyone helps each other. You don't get it in the big places.

EVEANNE: We've got a lot of Indigenous friends as well. A lot that Rig has grown up with. A lot of the women that though my step-father, I've got two step-brothers, and I've played darts with over the years and played sports, netball, and things like that and it will be sad to say goodbye to them. But we've always said, our home, our doors will always be open to anyone who comes to Geraldton. Anyone who comes to Geraldton, say hello.

That's one of the things we'd miss a lot. Our job here too you know, this has been good for us and the Shire have been good people to work for because 30 years, that's a long time to stay with one employer and we've always had a lot to do with the Shire. You see me come in and have a dig at the girls and have a bit of a laugh and all that.

Don't laugh, you'll go mad. It's true. So they say!

What is your favourite memory of Meeka?

RIGBY: I think my favourite memory is meeting my Wife. **EVEANNE**: And it is mine too because if I hadn't met Rigby, I wouldn't have stayed. Because, you know, I had mum and my stepfather here, yes, but I didn't like Meekatharra when I first came because I'm so used to Perth. But then once I got to meet Ruby and all his Gero. friends, they made me feel so welcome.

RIGBY: I spent 32 years in the Voluntary Fire Brigade too. Right from when I was 16 I joined the Fire Brigade. We were all involved in that and went away for fire

seven years between the oldest and youngest. So, you brigade demos and stuff like that, competition. So that know, the school was okay until getting into high school. was a big part of our life as well with our kids and they

> EVEANNE: I was just saying, we have got a lot of memories, you know, not only meeting one another and getting married and having our children. One daughter our youngest one, he was actually born here, he was one

> RIGBY: Yeah we had midwives back then and later on, it got cancelled out not long after our son was born. He was the only one that was born here.

> EVEANNE: Yeah, you know, and our kids are all growing up here and we had, you know, we used to do a lot of things together as a family. You know, we'd go camping and, you know. Go bush and camp out. Go bush all the time. Water holes and stuff like that.

> RIGBY & EVEANNE: It is our home, and still will be our home. And we will be back.

> RIGBY: We'll get a caravan up and go for a bit of a trip around.

INTERVIEWER: Moving is always a big thing hey?

RIGBY: We've only moved three times since we've been married and every time it's been in Meeka. Just different houses in Meeka. We've accumulated quite a bit of stuff over the years and with Evanne's mum being here and when then passed away we cleaned all her house and got a lot of that stuff and still trying to go through it and work out what we wanna keep.

EVEANNE: You know mum's been gone 13 years and I'm still going through her stuff and saying oh do I need to keep this and then my stepfather, it's nearly 9 years since he passed away and I'm doing the same. He gave Rig a lot of stuff before he passed away. Do we keep it or what do we do with it? Tools and things like that. Even they did take a lot of stuff, there was still a lot of stuff left here for us to go through. It's gonna be sad because my daddy's buried here and my mum is buried in Geraldton. I hope you guys are getting the support and love that you need in this space in your life. We've got our son coming tomorrow to help us take some, he's been up a couple of times and we traveled back together.


What is your last message for the Meeka Community?

INTERVIEW WITH A VOLUNTEER

Judy Holden

Volunteering for Community Resource Centre (CRC)
HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN VOLUNTEERING
WITH THE COMMUNITY RESOURCE CENTRE
(CRC)?

For about a year and a half now, I think I started in early 2022.

WHAT MADE YOU START VOLUNTEERING?

I had just become a Shire Councillor and the Shire CEO, Kelvin, asked whether I wanted to perhaps join the CRC committee. It's great to have a good synergy between the CRC and the Shire.

WHAT DO YOU DO AS PART OF YOUR ROLE?

I'm a committee member so attend the monthly committee meetings. They're only once a month on a Wednesday at 5.15pm. It's really quite relaxed.

WHAT DO YOU LIKE MOST ABOUT IT?

I like that it's community minded. Also, since we moved into the new space at the Lloyds Plaza it's so much better. It'll be even better once the tourism/visitor centre area is developed. And I like that the mines are involved – we have committee members from Westgold Resources, Australian Vanadium and Technology Metals.

WHAT'S THE WORST ASPECT?

Perhaps the lack of committee members... Sometimes we don't have a quorum as there aren't enough people so the meeting gets cancelled which is a bit of a shame. We do need more people to be involved.

DO YOU HAVE ANY INTERESTING/FUNNY/FASCINATING STORIES YOU CAN SHARE?

Hmm it's pretty straightforward... It's all good and everyone is very friendly.

WHAT'S SOMETHING PEOPLE DON'T KNOW OR SHOULD KNOW ABOUT VOLUNTEERING WITH THE CRC OR VOLUNTEERING IN GENERAL?

I think people don't realise that the CRC can bring new stuff to town, e.g. we're getting a new printer that can print on mugs, caps, shirts etc; that'll be very handy for local businesses and people wanting to print say gifts and things for special events like birthdays, any events happening in town it will be a great resource for the town. No waiting for deliveries.

Whilst people know that the CRC exists, they may not know that the committee is actually just made up of volunteers and that they, too, could be involved and help make those decisions.

The CRC has the potential to do so many things; we run the markets, we get involved in community events like the Easter event and NAIDOC week




plus of course the standard things the CRC staff do on a daily basis.

It's great to have different people with different strengths and experiences. If you have a conflict of interest just declare it.

INTERVIEWER: And the beauty of CRCs is also that they're all part of a network throughout regional towns in WA. So even if people are just here for a few months (e.g. nurses, teachers, government workers), could they still volunteer? And then perhaps if they move to another country town they could join the CRC there too with the experience they've gained here in Meeka? It's instant friends wherever you move!

JUDY: Yes absolutely. It's really easy to sign up, just go and see Jo at the CRC. You can start the very next meeting, no need for lengthy training or inductions. And because it's only a meeting once a month it's quite an easy volunteering role and yet as a committee we can make great things happen in town.



Backyard Buddies

European wasp close of season



Entrance of a subterranean (underground) European wasp nest. The nest entrance is easily hidden amongst leaves.

The European wasp 2022-23 season has drawn to a close with 21 nests found and destroyed.

The optimum time to detect and locate European wasps (*Vespula germanica*) has passed. Traps have been cleaned and now is the time to reflect on another fruitful surveillance season. It is also time to say thank you to everyone across WA who adopted a surveillance trap, kept an eye out and reported anything unusual!

How did we go?

Nest numbers were much lower than last season; 21 compared to 53. Nest distribution indicates multiple areas of incursion across Perth, predominantly in and around industrial areas — which is typical of this hitchhiking pest. The nests detected did not show signs of 'overwintering', which means they were created this season. This is a promising indication that nests were not missed during last season's surveillance activities.

Public awareness and reporting remained strong. Residents, businesses, and local government all detected wasp activity in good time. This allows for nests to be found and trapping areas expanded where required. And finally, there have been no signs or reports of wasp activity since April!

Season highlights:

- 2,800 surveillance traps deployed across the Perth metropolitan region
- 75 regional traps deployed with 0 detections
- 171 new traps adopted by the community, bringing the total of 'Adopt a trap' subscribers to 1076
- 350 public enquiries, with 4 confirmed detections
- 21 nests found and destroyed across 6 Local Government Areas, all in the Perth metropolitan region
- the majority of nests were found in embankments of water sumps and drains
- a nest was located in a wood log at primary school playground – yikes!
- wasp flight paths were tracked to locate a nest on Perth Airport grounds
- no public injuries were reported from disturbing these cryptic and often hidden nests

The surveillance season runs December to May but reports of suspect wasp activity can be made year-round. *Talking to your teenager about * alcohol

As a parent or caregiver, you influence your child's attitudes and decisions around alcohol more than you might think. Your advice and support helps keep them safe, even if it's not always welcomed.

No amount is safe for under 18s

The National Health and Medical Research Council recommends that children and young people under 18 should not drink alcohol to reduce risk of injury and harms to health.

Sips and tastes at home don't stop young people from risky drinking

Research consistently shows that, despite what some parents may think, giving your child alcohol at home or on special occasions under your supervision, is not a safe way to introduce them to alcohol.

Young people who get alcohol from their parents – even small amounts like sips and tastes – are more likely to start drinking at an early age, drink at levels considered high-risk for adults (binge drinking), get more alcohol from other sources like friends and experience harm from alcohol.

Quick tips for parents

Talk early, talk often

Take everyday opportunities to start the conversation (not a lecture) like at the dinner table, when you're driving them somewhere or watching TV together.

Know where your child is

Know what they are doing and who they are with. Get to know their friends, and friends' parents, where possible.

Make time to listen

This lets your child know you are interested and helps maintain a close relationship.

Know the facts

It's important your child knows the risks associated with alcohol but at the same time, if you use scare tactics, your child may dismiss what you are saying.

Leaving a rental home

When it comes time to move out of a rental property, knowing what's involved in advance can help ensure things run more smoothly.

How much notice to give depends on whether a fixed-term or periodic tenancy is being wound-up. Even though a fixed-term tenancy is for the period agreed in writing, it does not end automatically – notice must be given by either party 30 days' before the expiry date, or it will rollover into a periodic lease. A periodic tenancy can be concluded by the tenant giving at least 21 days' notice in writing, or the landlord/agent giving 60 days' notice.

In cases where a home has been repossessed by the mortgagee, such as a bank, you will be given 30 days' notice to move out. The mortgagee cannot ask you to pay rent during this 30-day period.

If you need to 'break lease', be aware that it can be costly. Firstly you'll need to seek written permission from the landlord and come to an arrangement, before potentially paying rent until a replacement tenant is found.

When vacating a rental, you are required to leave the property in the same condition (less fair 'wear and tear') as when you first moved in. For this reason, it is wise to ensure the Property Condition Report signed at the start is accurate, take photos of the property both at the beginning and end of the lease, plus attend the final inspection (if possible) to sort out any potential issues on the spot.

If you have not cleaned the property to a reasonable standard, or if minor repairs are needed, you'll probably need to meet the costs involved to fix the problem.

Landlords and agents cannot insist you use a specific company or trader to undertake any of the repairs or cleaning, neither can they charge you for a pre-estimated cost – they are only allowed to charge you for the actual costs incurred.

If there's a dispute over how the security bond is to be paid-out, you can apply for conciliation by Consumer Protection. Should that fail, the Magistrates Court can settle the matter.







YOUTH Youth Focus

Youth Focus Meekatharra's Young Women's Group aims to empower young people to heal from racial trauma, embrace their cultural identity, and build a legacy of strength and intergenerational healing within the Meekatharra Aboriginal community.

For the young women of the group, the power of talking, listening, and openly conversing has a big impact on self-esteem. "It makes me feel better about myself," one young woman stated.

By addressing racial trauma and promoting healing across generations, the group seeks to create lasting positive change and inspire other communities to do the same.

"By honouring the narratives of young people and reclaiming cultural practices, we can challenge Westernized standards and create a powerful ripple effect that extends beyond individual healing, inspiring systemic change," Nicholah says.

"Just as everything grows in red dirt, from the soil of colonisation, new narratives bloom. This toolkit will be watered and ushered by the young people of Meekatharra. By honouring their narratives and reclaiming cultural practices, we aim to create a powerful ripple effect that extends beyond individual healing to inspire systemic change."











The importance of Youth Focus Meekatharra's Young Women's Group has been brought to the fore at this year's <u>fair.ground conference</u>, hosted by Youth Affairs Council WA.

Mental Health Clinician Nicholah Wasarirevu and Youth Engagement Coordinator Deanne Young presented on the Meekatharra Young Women's Group, and the crucial role it plays in creating intergenerational healing, while providing a safe space for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young women.

"The Meekatharra Young Women's Group fosters a sense of sisterhood, cultural connection, and empowerment among the participants," Nicholah explains. "By providing safe and affirming spaces, these groups can have several positive impacts."

The Meekatharra Young Women's Group was started by Nicholah, Deanne and Youth Focus Meekatharra Team Leader Paulette Anderson, who wanted to create a safe space for young women to come together, connect, and bond through sisterhood.

For Deanne, the Young Women's Group holds special meaning, as her Great Grandmother, Avy Curley, established a club for the Aboriginal people in the town – the Bundi ("Good") Club – in Meekatharra in 1962. The Young Women's Group continues this legacy.

"Meekatharra's Young Women's Group is a safe space for young people to learn, share experiences, as well as passed-on knowledge from community members and Elders," Deanne explains.

"The long-term goal is to continue the passing down of knowledge from Elders and Aunties to the young women, empowering them and fostering generational healing," Deanne adds. "We accomplish this through music, art and cooking. We also host educational sessions including mindfulness, yoga, haircare, and dental hygiene."

According to Nicholah, the Young Women's Group allow participants to:

Heal. Through storytelling, art, and other therapeutic activities, young women can process their emotions, validate their experiences, and heal from intergenerational trauma. This healing process contributes to breaking the cycle of trauma transmission.

Build resilience. The group helps foster resilience by promoting a sense of belonging and cultural pride. Participants can draw strength from their shared experiences and cultural heritage, which can empower them to overcome adversity and navigate the challenges they face in their lives.

Develop leadership skills. By engaging in collective decision-making, organising events, and advocating for their rights, young women can develop confidence, assertiveness, and a sense of agency.

Come together with different generations. Elders and older community members can share their wisdom, cultural knowledge, and stories of resilience with younger generations, fostering a sense of continuity and connection to their cultural heritage.

Build collective strength. Young women's groups encourage intercultural sisterhood by bringing together participants from diverse backgrounds and cultural identities. This promotes understanding, empathy, and solidarity among Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young women and fosters a sense of collective strength.





- 2. Microwave on HIGH for 8 minutes, stopping and stirring every 2 minutes.

Stove top

- 1. Combine all ingredients in a small saucepan over medium heat.
- 2. Bring to a slow boil and then reduce the heat to low.
- 3. Cook porridge, stirring occasionally for 10 minutes or until thick.
