No matter how low you may feel, remember that reaching out is a sign of strength, not weakness. In Meekatharra, we are strong together, and there's always someone ready to help.


If you ever need a yarn, don't hesitate to talk to someone. You are never a burden.



Social Reinvestment and Advocacy Workshops

Last month, with the support of Social Reinvestment WA the Meekatharra community took significant steps forward in tackling youth justice issues.







Through a series of justice reinvestment and advocacy workshops, local leaders, community members, and youth advocates came together to determine the necessary actions needed to drive change. Discussions focused on tackling the root causes of youth justice issues, with an emphasis on ensuring the well-being for everyone in Meekatharra.

The outcome of these workshops was the development of a comprehensive community advocacy plan. The plan is designed to empower young people and offer families support and guidance where it's needed most.

Key actions:

- Strengthening community: Encouraging collaboration between local leaders, families, and youth advocates to provide guidance to young people.
- Improve access to legal support: Ensuring that people in Meekatharra can access the legal assistance they need, reducing the likelihood of unfair treatment and disadvantage.
- Investment in prevention: Shifting the focus from punitive measures to early intervention, education, and support services that address the underlying issues that result in entering justice systems.
- Empowering young people: Giving young people a voice in issues that directly affect them.

A huge thank you to the Social Reinvestment WA team for their facilitation of the workshops and ongoing support. A huge shout out to Meeka community for their passion and ongoing commitment in driving these changes.


SPORTING COMPLEX AND OVAL





Be breast aware this October!




October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month so it's an important time to shine a light on the impact that breast cancer has on many Australians. It's also important for people to get to know common breast cancer symptoms.

Women from regional Western Australia (WA) are known to delay going to a medical clinic when they were experiencing symptoms, with many experiencing self-doubt about the existence of the symptom. In 2019, 1,899 women in WA were diagnosed with breast cancer, and 259 women and one man lost their lives to it.

If you're unsure about a possible symptom, you should make an appointment to discuss the change with your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker as soon as possible. This is particularly important if it's been more than four weeks since you first noticed the change. Cancer treatments have improved in recent years, and it is much easier to successfully treat breast cancer if it is found early. The more it spreads, the harder it is to treat. So, we must Find Cancer Early.

Everyone's breasts are different. It is important that you get to know what your breasts look and feel like, so you know what is normal for you. There is no right or wrong way to check your breasts.

Common symptoms of breast cancer include:







- A change in the size, shape or feel of your breast.
- Change in the look of your breast, including redness, rash, or your skin looks like the skin of an orange, or is wrinkling in small folds.
- Changes to the nipple, like it's pulled inwards, leaking, itchy or has a sore that won't heal.
- Breast pain or discomfort, especially if it is only on one side.
- An area of the breast that feels different to the rest.

You can give yourself the best chance to Find Cancer Early, by going to see a doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker straight away if you have any of the symptoms above. The benefits to Finding Cancer Early is that treatment is easier, and you can be around longer to do the things you love doing with the people you love.

From glam to grim: When beauty becomes pain

Nerve damage, scarring, pain, burns, infections and psychological trauma. No, this isn't about medical negligence, it's about injuries received from beauty and cosmetic treatments.

How would you feel if a simple trip to get your eyelashes looking lush for an event ends with red, infected eyes and a course of antibiotics, or your first session of laser hair or tattoo removal results in painful burns that leave a scar?

These are some of the complaints Consumer Protection has been receiving from Western Australians with 29 complaints already received this year. A further 28 people have made enquiries with us about unsatisfactory experiences with operators in the beauty industry. Last year we saw a total of 112 complaints and 111 enquiries. Most problems relate to laser hair and tattoo removal, infections from nail salons, cosmetic tattooing gone wrong, waxing injuries or poor quality lash extensions.

While most operators are experienced and offer a professional service, WA consumers are urged to exercise caution when seeking beauty and cosmetic treatments. Botched procedures can have a significant impact.

If something goes wrong, a refund, credit or other remedy offered by the business would normally resolve consumer complaints, but this may not satisfy in a situation where someone is injured. They could also be seeking damages or compensation, which can only be achieved by taking civil court action.

The Australian Consumer Law (ACL) provides guarantees that the goods and services supplied will be of acceptable quality and be fit for any disclosed purpose as well as a requirement that operators carry out treatments or procedures with due care and skill.

Where a guarantee is breached, the ACL permits consumers to claim what is called "consequential damages", which means the trader is obliged to reimburse the customer's subsequent costs of any remedial care required to treat any injuries and symptoms caused by the original botched treatment.

What about other laws and regulations? This will depend on the treatment being carried out, as different procedures fall under different laws, regulations or codes of practice. Some treatments or procedures, such as eye lash extensions, do not have specific regulations.

You should never assume the person delivering a treatment or procedure has a medical qualification as this may not be required but it's still worth asking about their skills.

Check that the facility is clean and hygienic. Ask to see the products being used and read the label to check for anything you may be allergic to. Consider having an allergy test done first. While allergies aren't common, it's better to be safe than sorry.

Be wary of discounted prices that are far less than competitors – it may suggest counterfeit products or unqualified practitioners.

Importantly, see a health professional if you experience any discomfort, pain or irritation post-treatment. Problems can quickly go from bad to worse, so don't wait.

We urge consumers who have had a bad experience to report it to Consumer Protection, or specific regulators of that procedure, so that the circumstances can be investigated, and appropriate action taken.

Backyard Buddies

A picture's worth a thousand mouldy samples







Photos demonstrating a range of features in focus, thumb for scale, close-up of flowers as well as most of the plant. The only thing missing is a picture in situ - it's important to see how and where the plant is growing. This is an aquatic plant but you wouldn't guess it!

Weird plant, who do you call? DPIRD!

Imagine if we could turn back the clock and stop some of WA's worst weeds from becoming established, saving millions in eradication costs and lost agricultural revenue, not to mention the financial and mental burden of management for landholders.

Well, biosecurity is everybody's concern and here at DPIRD we rely on eagle-eyed members of the public to raise the alarm when they see something out of place. Whether that's a weedy looking, unfamiliar plant growing in your paddock, a patch of plants you've never seen before rapidly overtaking a roadside, or just something suspicious being traded online.

How to take quality pictures

You've found something of concern but what then? A few well taken photos offer advantages; they can be easily submitted from anywhere, allow for a rapid assessment and often negate the need to submit a sample. When photographing, remember the three F's, Features, Framing, Focus.

Features – try to capture as many as you can, fruit and flowers are especially helpful, but so are the leaves, their arrangement, whether they

are hairy or smooth, differences between the top and bottom surface, any thorns or spines, aim to include as much detail as possible.

Framing – try to also capture the whole plant, it's great to have close ups of leaves etc but what are they from? Is it a tree, is it shrub, is it a vine? Stand back, snap a pic and show us.

Focus – the most important F of them all, there's no point diligently documenting these features if they aren't in focus!

These photography tips will hopefully prevent wasted efforts in submitting inadequate or mouldy samples, which will be unusable for identification.

If a sample is needed, we will advise on how to collect the most useful material (whole plants, flowers, fruit, seeds etc) and how to package and post it to maintain its freshness for our diagnosticians.

How to submit your photos

You can contact our Pest and Disease Information Service (PaDIS) or report to the MyPestGuide team. Remember to include your contact details, the location of the plant(s) and your concerns when you are reporting. Our teams will review and provide identification and advice.







Visitors to the exhibition opening were also privy to experience a special Welcome to Country from respected Ngoonooru Wajarri Elder, 'Pop Shorty'.





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
