

What's been happening at the airport over the last few months!

There's always lots happening out at the airport that we don't see, Hercules planes performing training exercises, emergency services mass casualty training, real-life emergencies and general busy-ness.

Back in September this year, two Hercules RAAF C-130J-30 aircraft came to Meeka Airport and practiced a series of 'touch and go' exercises. "What does a touch and go exercise involve?" you ask. Well it's exactly that, the aircraft pilot comes in to land on the runway, touches down on the runway before taking off again.

To break it down a little more, it's a manoeuvre performed by a fixed wing aircraft and often used in training and upskilling new and seasoned pilots. During a touch and go exercise, the pilot approaches the runway to land, configures the plane for landing, and briefly touches down on the runway.

Instead of coming to a stop and taxiing off the runway, once the wheels touch down, the pilot reconfigures the plane for takeoff and executes a takeoff without stopping. Pretty impressive to watch when it happens!

The C-130J-30 Hercules is a medium-sized tactical air-lifter which can deliver cargo to airfields with short unsurfaced runways, and airdrop cargo and paratroops by parachute.

The Australian Defence Force relies extensively on the Hercules aircraft when deploying personnel and aid. The aircraft can also be used in other roles, such as search and survivor assistance, and medical evacuation.

These aircraft can carry up to 124 passengers, or eight pallets of cargo and can work alongside other airlifters, including the C-27J Spartan and C-17A Globemaster III.

Practice exercise turned real life!

Also held in September this year, was the biennial Airport Emergency Exercise. Meekatharra Emergency Services - St John Ambulance, Western Australia Police Force (WAPOL) and the Meekatharra Volunteer Fire and Rescue Services (VFRS) got to showcase their emergency response skills in a joint training exercise.

The Airport Emergency Exercise is mandatory and undertaken to test and assess each airports' Aerodrome Emergency Plan (AEP) with all responsible emergency service agencies.

All airports throughout Australia, are required to undertake an Airport Emergency Exercise every 2 years to meet Federal Airport legislation.

And then surprisingly, on Friday 15th November this year, there was a real-life airport emergency incident. This incident allowed the Airport personnel, Aircraft PAX and Meekatharra Emergency Services to join together and put their training into action. How exciting!

Fortunately there were no casualties in this incident, and it was seen as a great opportunity for our volunteers and service personnel alike, to put their training into action!

A big thank you to all of the volunteers who gave up their evening to train. Through shared training like this, they are better prepared to respond quickly and efficiently when it matters most.







Family and Domestic Violence Service

This service offers a community response to women and their children (if present) who are experiencing domestic violence or are concerned about their safety.

Support includes:

- Crisis accommodation up to 72—hours or with a Police Order
- Arranging transportation and alternative accommodation
- Essential emergency items such as food
- Links to counselling and other culturally appropriate services

Meekatharra Housing and-Support Service—Gumbarra Urda

Transitional Accommodation will provide a pathway for families, women and children who have a desire to transition out of unsafe and/or unstable housing situations with support. MHSS will provide medium term accommodation combined with case management and community development.

Remote Education and Learning—Ijaba

This service works with families and community to increase school attendance in Meekatharra.

Our team acknowledges that school attendance is a 'whole of community' responsibility and has adopted a family focused model to work specifically with parents, carers and other family members as well as Elders, the school, local residents, community organisations and government agencies.

Our aim is to identity and address the short and long term challenges that families encounter, which may impact on children and young people attending and staying at school.

Public Tenancy Support Service

This service supports people living in Public Housing who face difficulty maintaining their tenancy.

Our team aims to support tenants to increase their ability to avoid reaching the point of eviction, debts and property standards.

Mental Health Support Service

This service provides information support, advocacy, referral and counselling to Aboriginal people living in Meekatharra, Cue and Mount Magnet who experience and live with mental ill health.

Our team adopts a recovery-orientated model, placing significant emphasis on the choices and decisions of the individual. We aim to support people to make positive changes and reach their goals while continuing to participate fully in the community.

Grandparents Raising Grandchildren

This service supports grandparents living in Meekatharra, Cue and Mount Magnet who are the sole or primary carer of their grandchildren.

Emergency Relief

This service is offered to people experiencing significant financial distress, homelessness and other life challenges.

Immediate relief is available once every three months in the form of food hampers. In addition to referrals to other services. Appointments to Emergency Relief are essential.



Find Cancer Early: Tips when visiting your doctor about a possible symptom.

As we get older, many of us don't often think too much about a change to our body. This can result in us expecting and accepting changes over time as being normal.

But it is important to not be tempted to put something unusual down to 'getting older' before you've told your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker. Always have a chat and let them know what you've noticed, even if you're not concerned by it. Chances are it is nothing to worry about, but it's better to be on the safe side.

When you decide to make an appointment, lots of different questions and concerns can pass through your mind, such as:

- The doctor is always too busy.
- It's too hard to get an appointment.
- When I get to my appointment my mind goes blank.
- What could happen when I see the doctor or health worker?
- I don't have a doctor.
- I feel embarrassed or shame.

Tips when you are visiting your doctor/health professional:

- Be clear about your symptoms.
- Calling early in the morning is often the best time to arrange an appointment and if you feel it is urgent let the receptionist know this when you call.
- If your usual health professional isn't available that day, ask for their earliest available appointment, or ask to see another doctor.
- Write down why you've made the appointment and what you want to tell your health professional.
- Keep a symptom diary of what's been happening, how long for, and how often it occurs – you can take this with you.
- Health professionals are there to help you don't be embarrassed to let them know about any unusual changes you've noticed in your body.
- Take someone with you as a second pair of ears to listen & perhaps to take notes for you to clarify what is said at your appointment.

Become familiar with common cancer symptoms.

We encourage adults, especially those over 40 years of age, to be aware of some common symptoms of cancers. You can give yourself the best chance to **Find Cancer Early**, by going to see a doctor straight away if you have symptoms, so that treatment is easier, and you can be around longer to do the things you love doing with the people you love.

How can something so tiny kill in a matter of hours?

These days, stimulating toys are all about interactivity, lights, and movement. To activate, a button sized battery generally needs to be inserted, but if swallowed by a child has the power to cause severe injury in less than two hours and can even kill.

Button batteries are a small power source used not just for toys but for an increasing number of common household items such as remote controls, watches, clocks, and hearing aids.

A University of Sydney-led research study showed batteries 20mm or more in diameter are the most dangerous. They are small enough to be easily swallowed but not small enough to reliably pass through a child's throat.

What happens next will shock you, literally!

An electrical current is immediately triggered by saliva, causing a chemical reaction to cause severe burns to the child's throat and major internal organs within as little as two hours and the results can be fatal.

The study, which examined over 400 cases of button battery injuries and fatalities worldwide, shows while Australia has introduced the world's first mandatory safety standards with child-resistant packaging, the industry still needs to do more.

Once the packaging is open there is a vital need for safe storage, safe use, and safe disposal of batteries.

When buying button battery operated products, parents should look for products where the battery compartment can't be opened without the use of a tool.

If the compartment is not securely fastened with a screw or similar fastener, the product may not comply and could be added to the product recall list.

Even when old or used, button batteries can still be a threat, so safely dispose of them by wrapping them in sticky tape and putting them in a child resistant container, out of reach of children until you can recycle them safely. Recycle collection points can be found at www.bcycle.com.au.

If you suspect a child has swallowed a button battery do not let the child eat or drink and do not induce vomiting. Immediately call the Poisons Information Centre on 13 11 26 for additional treatment information.

It's Starting to Look a Lot Like Christmas...Spiders.

Have you ever been in the garden, or out walking in the bush and spotted a miniature Christmas bauble with legs? You might have encountered Austracantha minax, otherwise known as the Christmas or jewel spider, Australia's very own living holiday decoration! Some might say it gets its common name from the time it's most prolific, but where's the fun in that?

All about these beauties

These spiders are found throughout mainland Australia and surrounding islands. They're easily recognised during the summer months by their shiny black bodies adorned with patterns of white, yellow, or orange. Their most striking feature is the six spine-like projections on their abdomen. Females are larger, measuring 7 to 12 mm in length, and brightly coloured, whereas males are smaller at 3 to 5 mm and dark red/brown.

They are skilled web builders, creating intricate, interconnected webs ~ 1 to 2 meters from the ground, there are often as many as 30 individuals in these aggregations. Interestingly, they add white silk tufts to their support threads, making them visible to larger animals and preventing accidental damage.

Christmas spiders may be a sign of summer and the holidays here in Perth, but why don't we see them

the rest of the year? The answer is they're around but don't get those dazzling colours until they reach maturity, so much less conspicuous at other times.

Speaking of colour, it has been observed that later in the autumn months (typically from March to April), some Christmas spiders undergo a dramatic colour change, becoming melanistic - entirely dark brown to black in colour. It's speculated that darker coloration could allow the spiders to absorb heat more efficiently during the cooler autumn months, potentially extending their active period. 'The mysteries of these spiders, like other spiders, may continue to be revealed as the ever passionate but very few spider scientists record observations and do studies in the spiders likewise dwindling bushland homes.' - Dr Leanda Mason.

How to encourage them into your garden

As with trying to encourage any wildlife into your garden it is important to minimise the use of pesticides, as well as provide natural habitats and appropriate vegetation. Spiders flourish where there is good hunting, a diverse garden provides food sources and shelter for a greater variety of insect life. Remember, if there's no food for the bugs then there's no bugs for the spiders!







Shane Love MLA Slams Cook Labor Government's Process for Pastoral Lease Renewals

The Leader of the Opposition, Shane Love MLA, has strongly criticised the Cook Labor Government over its handling of proposed changes to pastoral lease renewals, calling for an immediate extension to the consultation period which closes on the 16th of December.

Mr. Love expressed deep concern that current pastoral leaseholders were not directly notified about the proposed changes or made aware of advertised consultations and the opportunity to submit feedback. "I find it incredible that pastoralists were not directly advised of the proposed changes and given every opportunity to contribute to what will directly impact them and their business." Mr Love said the draft lease conditions will have major implications for the pastoral sector, particularly:

- · Security and Duration of Leases.
- Native Title Compensation.
- · Compensation for non-renewal of leases
- Insurance Requirements and Indemnity Clauses.
- · No right provided to soil or timber.

"In order to plan long-term, implement sustainable agricultural practices, and raise finance, pastoralists need security of tenure and long-term leases." Mr Love said.

"The provisions around insurance and indemnity both present real issues for pastoralists. Without a cap on the level of public liability insurance required, pastoralists are open to exploitation by insurance companies, including the possibility of insurers refusing to offer cover."

Mr. Love highlighted that some pastoral properties might also include existing or old mining tenements with contaminated sites, making it unfair to burden pastoralists with the indemnity provision.

"Pastoralists can't stop prospectors from accessing their property. Does this mean they are liable for any accident or mishap that might occur on their station? It is unjust that pastoralists—the leaseholders—are required to indemnify the state—the landlord," Mr. Love said.

"Furthermore, the requirement for pastoralists, as leaseholders, to carry the compensation liability to native title parties is unreasonable," Mr. Love continued. "The Cook Labor Government is trying to shift this cost to pastoralists when they renew their leases, but the state owns the land and should retain the liability for native title compensation."

Mr. Love said that given the technical and legal nature of the proposals, additional time is necessary to seek expert advice and engage meaningfully with the consultation documents. "For this reason alone, it is appropriate that the deadline for submissions—presently listed as 16 December 2024—be extended by three months, and all pastoralists notified of the consultation on the proposed changes," he added.

"The proposed changes have the potential to reshape the pastoral industry. It is critical that the consultation process allows for broad, inclusive, and thorough feedback to ensure the long-term viability of Western Australia's pastoral industry."

Tip: Children enjoy these hand held treats on a hot day.




