C-130J Hercules Aircraft Take to the Skies Over Meekatharra

Residents may have noticed a bit of extra noise and excitement in the skies on Friday, 23 May, as two Royal Australian Air Force C-130J Hercules aircraft conducted flyovers and go-around exercises at Meekatharra Airport.

The twin aircraft made several low passes over the runway, performing training manoeuvres designed to simulate approaches and touch-and-go landings. These exercises are a routine part of RAAF pilot training, helping crews stay sharp and maintain readiness for operations across a variety of environments, including remote airfields like ours.

The impressive sight (and sound) of the C-130Js drew attention from many locals, with some heading out to get a closer look. Known for their size, versatility, and reliability, the Hercules aircraft are a mainstay of Australia's air mobility fleet.

A big thanks to the RAAF crews for giving Meeka a glimpse of their work and for keeping their flight paths respectful of the town while they trained.

What's a Go-Around?

A go-around is a standard manoeuvre where an aircraft discontinues its approach to landing and climbs away for another circuit. It's used in both training and real-life scenarios to ensure safety and flexibility during landing operations.

For the C-130J, which has a wingspan of 40 metres and a maximum takeoff weight of over 70,000 kg, mastering these approaches especially on shorter or more isolated runways is vital.

With the exercises announced early on Friday morning, word quickly spread around town, and a number of curious locals made their way to vantage points near the airport, adding some excitement to the day.





The C-130J Super Hercules is known for its versatility, capable of transporting troops, cargo, vehicles, and even conducting aeromedical evacuations. It can operate from short, unsealed runways which makes it ideal for operations in remote or rugged locations like the Pilbara and Gascoyne regions.

As the Hercules pair completed their circuits and disappeared into the northern sky, they left behind both a trail of jet wash and a memorable buzz of excitement for Meeka's aviation enthusiasts.

Mission Australia provided vouchers from Coles **Express** for the best rubbish collectors. Youth Focus and WA Police also supported this community event and provided some volunteers on the day.

Rescue Helicopter fleet upgrade ignores the Mid-West

The Nationals WA have condemned the State Government for once again ignoring expert advice to base an emergency rescue helicopter in the Mid-West, while pouring \$26.7 million into new aircraft for Perth and the South West.

Leader and Member for Mid-West, Shane Love MLA, said the latest investment would do nothing for communities north of Perth where access to emergency services is already stretched.

"By concentrating every rescue helicopter in Perth and Bunbury, the State Government is denying thousands of Mid-West residents access to a life-saving services," Mr Love said.

"This is despite repeated warnings from the Department of Fire and Emergency Services, the State Coroner, and the Chief Health Officer that our rescue helicopter fleet must expand into the regions."

Mr Love said the Chief Health Officer's landmark 2022 Inquiry into WA's aeromedical services - which called for urgent expansion - had been "virtually discarded" by the Cook Labor Government.

"It's diabolical that a government boasting multi-billion-dollar surpluses continues to ignore its own experts and the communities of the Mid-West on such as critical issue.

"Meanwhile, they continue to push forward with a \$217 million racetrack and a billion-dollar redevelopment of the Perth Convention Centre while delivering substandard regional healthcare."

Member for Geraldton Kirrilee Warr MLA said the decision showed regional lives were not valued equally under WA Labor.

"Unless you live in Perth or the South West, you are simply not a priority for this Government," she said.

"Geraldton is one of the busiest regions for the Royal Flying Doctor Service and St John Ambulance, yet we are left without a rescue helicopter that could save lives on our roads, at sea, and in remote areas."

Ms Warr said the Government had already broken its promise to establish a RFDS base in Geraldton, and its refusal to back a Mid-West rescue helicopter was "further proof" of its disregard for regional health.

"In an emergency, every second counts. Right now, people in the Mid-West are forced to wait, and that wait could cost lives."

Shadow Minister for Emergency Services, Hon Rob Horstman MLC, said that every West Australian deserved equitable access to life-saving services.

"The Inquiry into Aeromedical Services was clear, doubling our rescue helicopter fleet is the priority, yet two years on communities in the Mid West and northern WA remain dangerously exposed."

"Emergency response can't be a postcode lottery. The Government talks about modernising our fleet yet ignores the glaring gap in the Mid West," Mr Horstman said.

Labor failing Murchison families with stalled School Dental Van Service

Member for Mid-West and Leader of The Nationals WA Shane Love MLA has slammed the Cook Labor Government for failing to deliver the School Dental Van Service to the Murchison, leaving children without access to vital oral health care since 2023.

Mr Love said that schools in Yalgoo, Mt Magnet, Meekatharra and Cue have now gone two years without a visit from the School Dental Van.

"The Government promised that a new, larger dental van was under construction and would be ready by late 2024," Mr Love said.

"Yet here we are in August 2025 — and still, there is no van, no service, and no certainty for families."

Mr Love said the absence of the service was particularly damaging for the Murchison, where children already face unique health disadvantages.

"These towns are remote — up to 420 kilometres from Geraldton — and families simply do not have alternative access to dental care," he said.

"Without this service, children in the Murchison are being left behind and placed at greater risk of serious health problems later in life."

"I've heard of children as old as seven who have never seen the dentist before."

Today Mr Love received a response from the Minister for Health, who blamed a manufacturing defect and ongoing staffing challenges for the continued failure to deliver the dental van service.

"If your family car was recalled for a defect, you wouldn't accept waiting two years for a replacement — yet that's exactly what the Minister expects families in the Murchison to endure."

Mr Love has called on the Cook Labor Government to immediately deploy a van and guarantee that students in the Murchison will not miss out on another year of dental care.

"The Cook Labor Government must stop making excuses. Our children's health cannot wait."







Midwest and Gascoyne Services Meekatharra



Family and Domestic Violence Service

This service offers a community response to women and their children (if present) who are experiencing domestic violence or are concerned about their safety.

Support includes:

- Crisis accommodation up to 72—hours or with a Police Order
- Arranging transportation and alternative accommodation
- Essential emergency items such as food
- Links to counselling and other culturally appropriate services

Meekatharra Housing and-Support Service—Gumbarra Urda

Transitional Accommodation will provide a pathway for families, women and children who have a desire to transition out of unsafe and/or unstable housing situations with support. MHSS will provide medium term accommodation combined with case management and community development.

Remote Education and Learning—Ijaba

This service works with families and community to increase school attendance in Meekatharra.

Our team acknowledges that school attendance is a 'whole of community' responsibility and has adopted a family focused model to work specifically with parents, carers and other family members as well as Elders, the school, local residents, community organisations and government agencies.

Our aim is to identity and address the short and long term challenges that families encounter, which may impact on children and young people attending and staying at school.

Public Tenancy Support Service

This service supports people living in Public Housing who face difficulty maintaining their tenancy.

Our team aims to support tenants to increase their ability to avoid reaching the point of eviction, debts and property standards.

Mental Health Support Service

This service provides information support, advocacy, referral and counselling to Aboriginal people living in Meekatharra, Cue and Mount Magnet who experience and live with mental ill health

Our team adopts a recovery-orientated model, placing significant emphasis on the choices and decisions of the individual. We aim to support people to make positive changes and reach their goals while continuing to participate fully in the community.

Grandparents Raising Grandchildren

This service supports grandparents living in Meekatharra, Cue and Mount Magnet who are the sole or primary carer of their grandchildren.

Emergency Relief

This service is offered to people experiencing significant financial distress, homelessness and other life challenges.

Immediate relief is available once every three months in the form of food hampers. In addition to referrals to other services. Appointments to Emergency Relief are essential.

What to do:

- 1. Follow DRSABCD St John WA Action Plan.
- 2. Urgent medical aid. Call Triple Zero (000) for an ambulance.
- 3. Ensure the casualty does not move.
- 4. Lay the casualty down, rest and reassure.
- 5. If the bite is on a limb, apply a broad pressure bandage over the bite site as soon as possible.
- 6. Then apply a further elasticised or firm bandage start at fingers or toes and move up the limb as far as can be reached. Apply tightly but without stopping blood flow.
- 7. Splint the limb including the joints on either side of the bite.
- 8. Write down the time that the casualty was bitten and when the bandage was applied.
- 9. If the casualty becomes unconscious and not breathing normally, Commence CPR and Defibrillation.

Signs and symptoms

- Visible in an hour or more after the person has been bitten.
- In children, signs and symptoms may appear within minutes.
- Paired fang marks, but often only a single mark or a scratch mark may be present. Marks or scratches may bleed.
- Nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea.
- Headache, drowsiness, giddiness or faintness.
- Double or blurred vision, drooping eyelids.
- Voice changes, trouble speaking or swallowing. Pain or tightness in the throat, chest or abdomen.
- Breathing difficulties, respiratory weakness or arrest.

Do not wash the venom off the skin (it may aid in identification). **Do not** cut the bitten area and try to suck the venom out.

Do not use a tourniquet.

Do not try and catch the snake.

What you need to know about dealing with debt collectors

Facing debt collectors can be overwhelming, especially when you're unsure of your rights or how to respond.

Debt collection is a legitimate and necessary business activity used to recover money that consumers owe and are required to pay. A debt collector could be the original credit or service provider, or a debt collection agency acting on the creditor's behalf. Sometimes debts are sold, and the debt buyer is the one doing the collecting.

If a debt collector contacts you, then you should be cooperative, but you should also expect to be treated with fairness, respect and courtesy.

Under Australian law, a debt collector cannot use physical force, harassment, threats or abuse to make you to pay your debt.

They also cannot make any statement or behave in ways that are misleading or deceptive. For example, impersonating someone or attaching a fake letterhead to a document. You have a right to seek a repayment arrangement, and you cannot be pressured into using your superannuation, borrowing money from friends or family or getting into further debt.

Any vulnerability or disability cannot be taken advantage of when collecting a debt and your personal information must be protected.

These laws also apply when contacting anyone connected to you. This includes a spouse, partner or family member.

The Australian Securities and Investments Commission and the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission have published joint guidelines about when a debt collector can contact you.

Contact must be for a reasonable purpose only, and communications must not be excessive. Generally, contact by letter or telephone will be the most appropriate form of contact.

Debt collectors should attempt to call you first before making face-to-face contact, and unless you have specifically requested or agreed to the visit, should only visit your workplace as a last resort.

In most circumstances, phone contact should be between 7.30am and 9pm on business days, and 9am to 9pm on weekends. Additionally, face-to-face contact should generally only take place

between 9am and 9pm. However, it is important to note that what constitutes "reasonable contact" will differ in each situation.

Debt collectors must not visit your home or work if you've refused, and you have provided an alternative way to communicate. If asked to leave, they must do so immediately.

In Western Australia, debt collectors must be licensed and deemed to be a person of good character and repute and a fit and proper person to hold the licence. If you feel that you are being harassed or unfairly treated by a debt collector, let Consumer Protection know 1300 30 40 54 or email consumer@demirs.wa.gov.au.

Prevention is always better than cure, so if you find yourself struggling with debt or to negotiate with a debt collector, contact a financial counsellor near you for free help - fcawa.org or call the National Debt Helpline at 1800 007 007. The Consumer Credit Legal Service of WA can also provide free legal advice on debt issues through their advice line 9221 7066 or www.cclswa.org.au.

The Curious Case of the Case-Making Moth

Spotted a tiny twig caravan mysteriously travelling along a branch recently? You may have encountered one of nature's most underrated engineers — the case moth. These oddball caterpillars turn silk and local materials into tiny, mobile homes they carry everywhere, like little sleeping bags on a mission.

Welcome to the weird and wonderful world of case moths, found throughout bushland, urban gardens, and natural areas across Australia.

Biology and Lifecycle

While most case moths belong to the family Psychidae, a few other silk case-making moths exist in families such as Tineidae (for example, the case-bearing clothes moth, however these are not the focus of this story). All case moths belong to the vast Lepidoptera order (which includes all moths and butterflies). There is estimated to be hundreds of species of case moths, with a significant number found in Western Australia, however the exact number is not known due to ongoing taxonomic updates and new discoveries.

What makes them so fascinating is not just their DIY homes, but their highly specialised life cycle. After hatching, each larva immediately begins constructing its own silk case using materials from the environment — bark, leaves, twigs, sand, or lichen, depending on the species and habitat.

As the larva grows, instead of leaving the case behind it expands it, reinforcing the structure as needed. The case serves as shelter from predators and weather, and it's always dragged along during movement (think "a botanic onesie with legs"). When the caterpillar is ready to pupate, it seals off the ends and undergoes metamorphosis inside the case, transforming into a pupa and then eventually emerging as an adult moth- or not! In many species, adult females will remain wingless and

larva-like, never leaving the safety of their case. They have underdeveloped legs and no working mouthparts spending their entire adult life emitting pheromones to attract a male. Once mated, the female lays her eggs inside the same case and dies soon after. The cycle then begins anew. Males, on the other hand, emerge with fully developed wings and feathered antennae, which they use to locate females by scent. But it's a brief adult life for males, usually just a few days, living only long enough to find a mate and reproduce.

Impacts and Management

Want to know how to live with (or gently manage) these silk-case residents? The good news is case moths are more fascinating than fearsome. They do not swarm, rarely cause serious or lasting damage to plants, and are not known to be a major pest in Western Australia. In fact, they are generally considered beneficial within the environment. Although some species do feed on living foliage, many others feed on dead leaves, bark, algae or lichens, helping to break down organic material and recycling nutrients back into the soil. They are also an important food source for native wildlife.

Case moth caterpillars are architects, camouflage artists, nutrient recyclers, and a nutritious snack for wildlife, all wrapped up in a snug, organic, portable shelter. They help keep our ecosystems balanced, quietly working away in the background supporting biodiversity, all without asking for much in return.

In a world full of flashy butterflies and buzzy bees, it might be easy to overlook the humble case moth. But maybe it's time we gave these miniature marvels their moment, because let's be honest — watching a tiny caterpillar drag around a twig-covered tent like a snail with a fashion sense? That's very cool.



HEALTHY BASIC BEAN BOWLS

RECIPE



Ingredients

- ▲ 1 400 g can mixed beans, black beans or kidney beans

- ▲ 1 red capsicum, chopped
- ▲ 1/2 avocado, chopped
