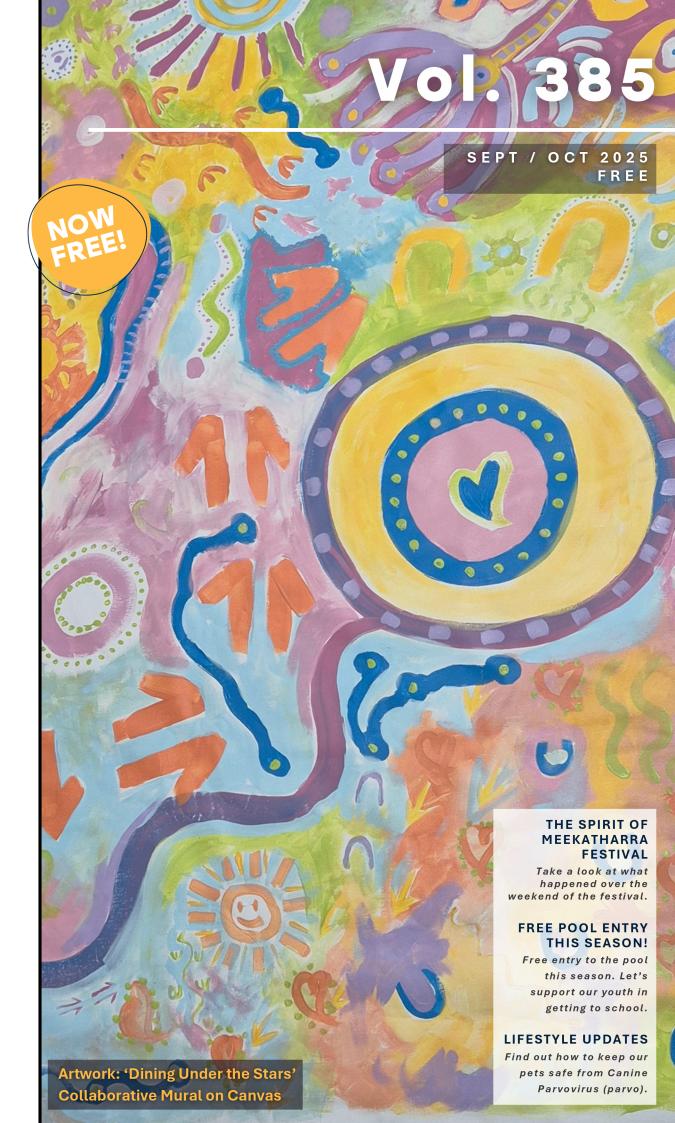

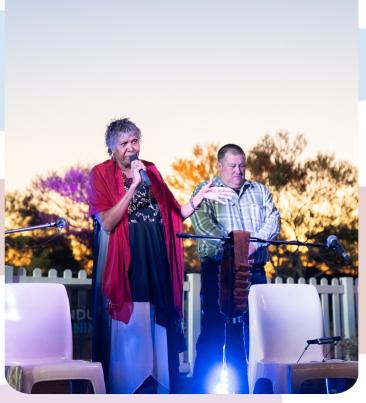

Midwest and Gascoyne Services Meekatharra



Family and Domestic Violence Service

This service offers a community response to women and their children (if present) who are experiencing domestic violence or are concerned about their safety.

Support includes:

- Crisis accommodation up to 72—hours or with a Police Order
- Arranging transportation and alternative accommodation
- Essential emergency items such as food
- Links to counselling and other culturally appropriate services

Meekatharra Housing and-Support Service—Gumbarra Urda

Transitional Accommodation will provide a pathway for families, women and children who have a desire to transition out of unsafe and/or unstable housing situations with support. MHSS will provide medium term accommodation combined with case management and community development.

Remote Education and Learning—ljaba

This service works with families and community to increase school attendance in Meekatharra.

Our team acknowledges that school attendance is a 'whole of community' responsibility and has adopted a family focused model to work specifically with parents, carers and other family members as well as Elders, the school, local residents, community organisations and government agencies.

Our aim is to identity and address the short and long term challenges that families encounter, which may impact on children and young people attending and staying at school.

Public Tenancy Support Service

This service supports people living in Public Housing who face difficulty maintaining their tenancy.

Our team aims to support tenants to increase their ability to avoid reaching the point of eviction, debts and property standards.

Mental Health Support Service

This service provides information support, advocacy, referral and counselling to Aboriginal people living in Meekatharra, Cue and Mount Magnet who experience and live with mental ill health.

Our team adopts a recovery-orientated model, placing significant emphasis on the choices and decisions of the individual. We aim to support people to make positive changes and reach their goals while continuing to participate fully in the community.

Grandparents Raising Grandchildren

This service supports grandparents living in Meekatharra, Cue and Mount Magnet who are the sole or primary carer of their grandchildren.

Emergency Relief

This service is offered to people experiencing significant financial distress, homelessness and other life challenges.

Immediate relief is available once every three months in the form of food hampers. In addition to referrals to other services. Appointments to Emergency Relief are essential.

Lifestyle | First Aid Tips



What to do:

- 1. Follow DRSABCD St John WA Action Plan.
- 2. Urgent medical aid. Call Triple Zero (000) for an ambulance.
- 3. Ensure the casualty does not move.
- 4. Lay the casualty down, rest and reassure.
- 5. If the bite is on a limb, apply a broad pressure bandage over the bite site as soon as possible.
- 6. Then apply a further elasticised or firm bandage start at fingers or toes and move up the limb as far as can be reached. Apply tightly but without stopping blood flow.
- 7. Splint the limb including the joints on either side of the bite.
- 8. Write down the time that the casualty was bitten and when the bandage was applied.
- 9. If the casualty becomes unconscious and not breathing normally, Commence CPR and Defibrillation.

Signs and symptoms

- Visible in an hour or more after the person has been bitten.
- In children, signs and symptoms may appear within minutes.
- Paired fang marks, but often only a single mark or a scratch mark may be present. Marks or scratches may bleed.
- Nausea, vomiting and diarrhoea.
- Headache, drowsiness, giddiness or faintness.
- Double or blurred vision, drooping eyelids.
- Voice changes, trouble speaking or swallowing. Pain or tightness in the throat, chest or abdomen.
- Breathing difficulties, respiratory weakness or arrest.

Do not wash the venom off the skin (it may aid in identification).

Do not cut the bitten area and try to suck the venom out.

Do not use a tourniquet.

Do not try and catch the snake.

Understanding Parvovirus in Dogs

Canine Parvovirus (often called Parvo) is a virus that affects dogs, particularly young puppies and those that are not vaccinated. It is a highly contagious virus that primarily impacts the gastrointestinal system, leading to symptoms such as:

- Vomiting
- Bloody diarrhoea
- Lethargy
- Loss of appetite
- Dehydration

The virus spreads through contact with infected dogs or contaminated surfaces such as soil, food

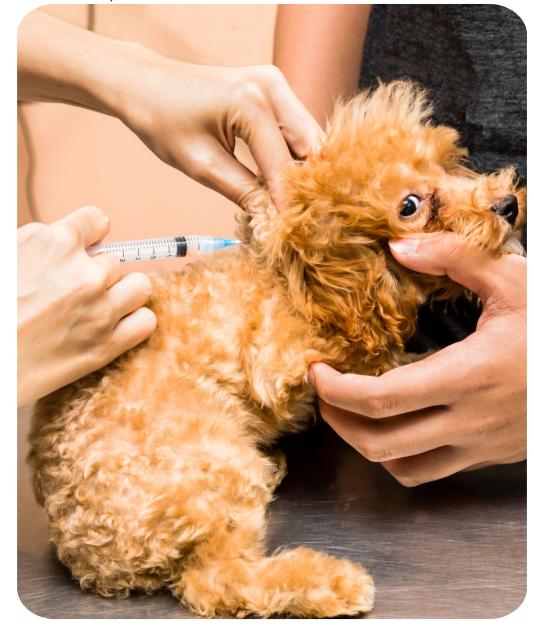
bowls, or kennels. It is extremely resilient and can survive in the environment for months.

The best way to protect dogs against Parvo is through vaccination. Puppies should start their vaccinations at 6–8 weeks of age, with follow-up boosters as advised by a veterinarian. Adult dogs should also be kept up to date with their vaccinations.

Maintaining good hygiene and avoiding exposure to unvaccinated dogs or potentially contaminated areas can also help reduce the risk.

If a dog shows any signs of illness, especially if they are young or unvaccinated, it is important to seek veterinary care as soon as possible.

The old-school hack for debt-free shopping

Whether or not you want to admit it, Christmas will be here before you know it. To avoid a frantic rush to the shops, you might like to get your present shopping done early and maybe take advantage of a sale or two.

Instead of falling into a buy now pay later (BNPL) debt trap or paying interest on the credit card, have you considered using good old-fashioned lay-by?

When money is tight, lay-bys are a great budget-friendly option. For many households, it is also an easy way to manage larger or seasonal purchases without financial strain.

You pay a deposit, around 10 per cent, and then make regular payments over an agreed period. Lay-bys typically run for 10 weeks, and you'll usually have to pay a small set-up cost. For most large retailers this is fee is about \$3.

You can't take the items home with you until they're paid off, but the upside is you don't have to worry about finding a hiding spot for the pressies.

When you enter into a lay-by agreement make sure you receive it in writing and that you understand it before signing. This is your contract with the store, and it must set out key details such as the total price, the amount of the deposit, how much is still owed, the payment schedule, and the shop's contact details.

The agreement must also explain what happens if you or the store cancels the lay-by, including any fees that apply.

You can change your mind and end the agreement before collecting the item. You'll get back any money you've already paid but the store may charge a cancellation fee. This is usually between \$10-20. This fee must be reasonable and reflect the store's actual costs.

For example, if a shopper cancels a lay-by for summer sporting gear late in the season, the store may need to discount the equipment, and the termination fee could cover that loss.

If the store breaks or damages the product before the customer collects it, no cancellation fee can be charged.

Stores also have rights under lay-by agreements. If you don't keep up with payments or break the rules of the contract, the shop may cancel the agreement. When this happens, the store must return the money already paid, minus any fees.

If you are finding it hard to make a payment, contact the store first to discuss your options before cancelling the lay-by.

Most large retailers offer a lay-by service but it's worth asking anyway, some will offer it a couple of months out from Christmas time.

HEALTHY BERRY FRUIT JELLY

RECIPE



Ingredients

- ▲ 2 cups no-added-sugar apple and blackcurrant juice
- ▲ 3 tsp powdered gelatine
- ▲ 1/2 tsp rosewater essence, optional
- ▲ 250 g strawberries, quartered or 300g frozen mixed berries or blueberries
- Cook Mode Prevent your screen from going dark

Method

- 1. Place ½ cup juice and gelatine into a 1-litre microwave safe jug. Microwave on HIGH for 1 minute to boil and dissolve gelatine.
- 2. Mix well while pouring in remaining juice and essence.
- 3. Divide fruit among four 250ml (1-cup) capacity serving glasses.
- 4. Pour juice over fruit and carefully stir with a teaspoon to distribute fruit through jelly.
- 5. Cover each glass with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 4 hours or overnight until set.

Hint

These jellies are best made 6 to 8 hours before serving. If left for more than 24 hours, the fruit will begin to soften in the jelly. Rosewater essence is found in baking aisle of supermarket with other flavourings and vanilla. It is inexpensive and adds a subtle sophisticated 'Turkish delight' flavour.

European wasp successful season







European wasps feed on grapes and other fruit, human and pet food, insects and dead animals like rats, kangaroos and bandicoots.

The European wasp 2024-25 season has drawn to a close with 31 nests found and destroyed!

Western Australians can now relax and enjoy the coming few months knowing that the aggressive and invasive pest has once again been thwarted in its efforts to establish itself in WA. Every year fertilised queens enter WA via vehicles, freight and cargo from interstate where they are well established and a major social, environmental and economic pest.

WA has been entrenched in a battle for the past 48 years to prevent this pest from calling our state home. Since the first detection in 1977 WA has undergone a surveillance and eradication program, developing early detection techniques and trapping systems to locate and destroy any nests that spawn in WA. A large part of this success is due to public awareness and reporting of wasp sightings. Three of the nests destroyed this season were due directly to public reports.

The majority of nests were detected and destroyed in the City of Belmont and City of Canning in industrial areas that take delivery of interstate freight, as well as around the interstate rail freight yards. There were two regional nests destroyed: one in the suburb of Webberton in Geraldton and one in the town of Napier just north of Albany. Around 3000 surveillance traps were deployed in the Perth metropolitan area and in strategic higher risk regional centres.

What to look for

There are similar looking black and yellow wasps in WA, so look for these key characteristics:

- Scavenging on human food and drinks, fruit like grapes, apples and stone fruit, pet food and roadkill (carrion).
- Nest underground nests are HUGE, growing larger than a basketball in a single season, and have a small (golf ball sized) entrance hole.
- Completely black antenna.
- Legs up in flight (rear legs don't dangle).

Biosecurity Blitz 2025: Scanning for Land and Water Invaders

Vigilance is key

Spotting invasive species early helps prevent pest outbreaks and protects our local environment. When community members report what they see, we can identify these species quickly and act before they spread. Your observations make a real difference in managing these threats.

Power in numbers

Keen-eyed observers across Western Australia can sign up to take part in DPIRD's <u>Biosecurity Blitz</u> 2025 (16 October to 16 November) to report not just pests, but also unsung beneficial organisms that play a vital role in maintaining ecological balance, pollination, and naturally help control pest populations.

Past Biosecurity Blitz observations revealed increased sightings of beneficial bugs like hover flies and lacewings in urban gardens, clear signs that habitat-friendly practices are taking root across local communities. Predators, such as lacewings, ladybirds, and predatory mites, actively hunt and consume pests. Parasitic wasps, hover flies, and even some spiders, lay their eggs on or inside pest species. Their larvae then feed on the host, often killing it in the process.

Community observations help shape the story of WA's biodiversity. What new discoveries will this year's Biosecurity Blitz uncover? DPIRD encourages people of all ages to sign up, download the MyPestGuide® Reporter app, submit sightings, and share photos to help map beneficial species and confirm the absence of exotic pests across WA.

Don't forget the waterways

Biosecurity Blitz 2025 isn't just about gardens and bushland—it's also about what's lurking in our waterways. Invasive aquatic species like carp and the carpet sea squirt (*Didemnum vexillum*)

threaten WA's biodiversity and can spread through floods, fishing, boating, and pet release. Other pests like non-native crustaceans, molluscs, and worms, can disrupt ecosystems and impact industries like aquaculture and tourism.

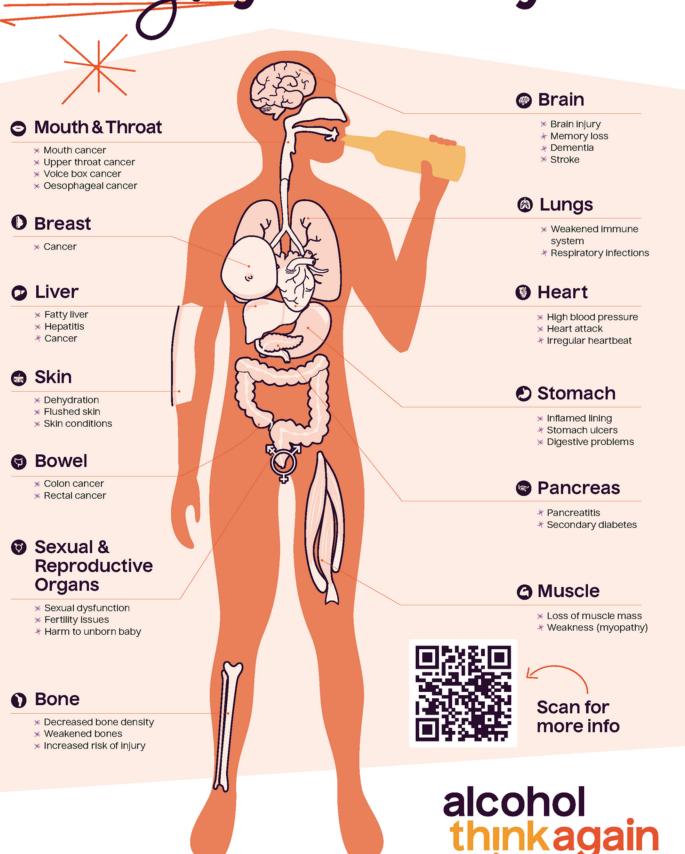
Even hardy aquarium fish can become invasive if released. Pearl cichlids, for example, are not native to Australia and compete aggressively with local species. Originally 5–15 cm as pets, they've grown to over 30 cm in Perth waterways!

While taking part in the Blitz, report any sightings of released aquarium fish using the MyPestGuide® Reporter app. Your actions help protect WA's aquatic ecosystems. Happy hunting!
